The Season Isn't Over Yet: Tips for Fall Golf

Most of us find ourselves putting the clubs in the shed, attic, or garage after Labor Day weekend, but let's not forget how beautiful fall golf can be! As the leaves show their true colors and the air gets crisper, courses tend to be in their best shape all year.

With fair-weather golfers hanging up their shoes before winter, finding a last-minute tee time isn't too hard. But there are a few things to prepare for with fall golf.

Arrive at the course with enough time to stretch and get loose. Your muscles will take longer to prepare for a round than even a month ago.

It's time to layer up, too! Wear warmer clothes but make sure they don't get in the way of comfort and range-of-motion. The warmer you are, the better you'll play.

Another way to stay warm is ditching the cart and taking a walk. Playing your round at midday, when the sun is warmest, may also help.

Since cold air is denser than warm air—by some calculations, costing you two yards of carry for every 10 degrees colder—many players also switch the ball they play as temperatures drop.

Try going from a three-to-four-piece ball down to a two-piece ball, which compresses more easily, allowing it to spin and keeping it in the air longer.

While you can't warm up the air, you can warm up your equipment. Some golfers soak towels in hot water and wrap their two-piece balls for 30 minutes, then store them in an insulated bag until tee time. Even holding them in your palms for a few minutes can help.

But it's not just falling temperatures we need to plan for; the autumn breeze is notorious for pushing shots around. Stay in control with a knockdown shot, low and under the wind.

When attempting a knockdown shot, keep your hands ahead of the ball at impact,

as though trying to take some loft off your iron. Choke down on the club and swing with a steady tempo and rhythm. This will force the ball to come off lower than usual.

Achieving low flight is a true challenge, but with practice, now is the perfect time to master it.

If you're in between clubs on an approach shot, always club up to get it there. Be aware that, along with your muscles, colder weather will also firm up the course, and you'll get plenty of roll off your drive.

This also means when you're approaching the green, your ball can like to roll off the back.

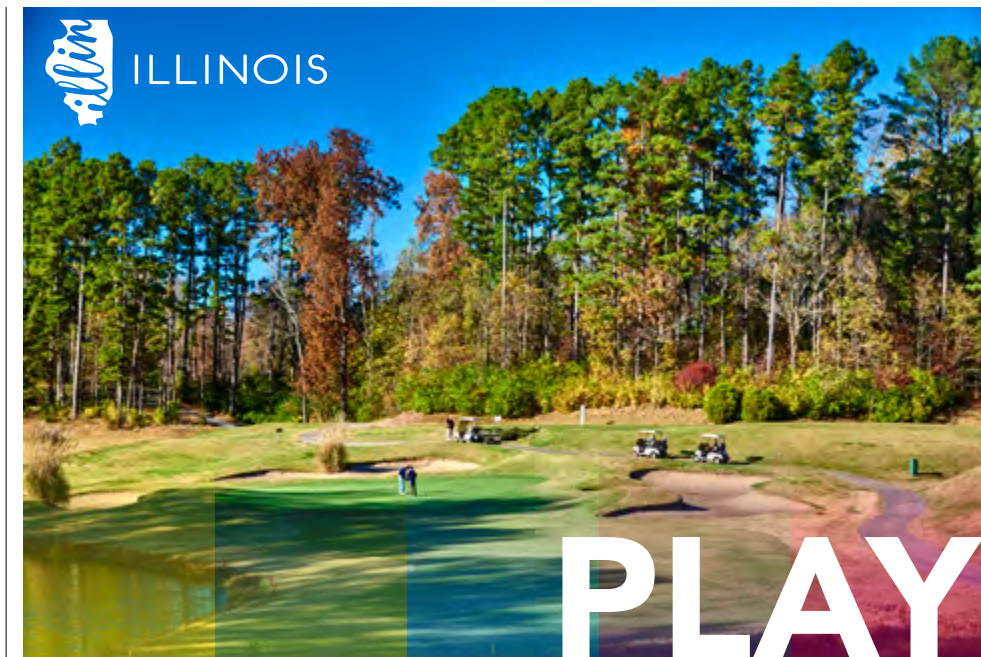
If that happens, take a moment to relieve your frustration by looking around the course. Chances are you'll see stunning shades of red, gold, orange, yellow, brown, and burgundy. Look even closer and you may spot chipmunks gathering food for their burrows and birds preparing for winter migration.

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Why Arnold Palmer Mattered

Arnold Palmer ceased to be a competitive factor in championship golf in the late 1980s, when he was still a semi-regular on the senior tour. Yet when he died on September 25 at 87, the world of golf shuddered, and the rest of the world took notice.

What was it about this man that so compelled us to watch his every shot, long after what he shot mattered?

It was because you, and every member of Arnie's Army, mattered to him. The simple act of being interested in him brought forth a connection between Arnold Daniel Palmer and each of his fans, one at a time, and that would be everlasting.

It is said the man signed a million autographs. He probably shook thrice that many hands. He was a man of the people because he liked people, wanted to be around people.

Every one of those people who met Arnold, spent even five seconds with him, has a story.

That's because, unlike many people and most athletes, Arnold Palmer looked you in the eye, and for those five seconds, you were the most important person in his world. He was magnetic in that way, drawing you in.

Mark d'Ercole, a friend in San Francisco, recalls going to the Lucky International at Harding Park in 1963 as a kid with his dad, specifically to see Palmer.

"As we get to the Arnie group he makes a birdie," Mark wrote. "I had never been to a golf tournament to begin with and all I remember was it was highly electric and the buzzing was intense. The next hole is a par 3 uphill. Arnie hits his drive to about four feet and the crowd

just goes nuts. For the next ten minutes it built up to Arnie's birdie putt. He lined it up from everywhere and then gets ready to putt when just as he pulls the putter back there's this loud crack of a tree branch now populated by spectators.

"Arnie misses the putt and the crowd gasps and then groans. I was back from the crowd surrounding the green and, without realizing it, directly in the path from the green to the next tee.

Arnie's breaking through the people and heading straight towards me with a sour look on his face. Reflexively, I held a Lucky International Program along with a pen I brought out to him and said, 'Mr. Palmer, can I have your autograph?' And he blurted out, 'Not now.' I was crushed as my hero brushed me aside but in retrospect lucky I didn't get swatted aside as he went past me.

"At the end of the day, my dad took me over to this area where the players seemed to be coming off the 18th. Arnie, when I approached, him said something like, 'Oh, you're the boy from the par 3.'

That memory from 53 years ago is one more bit of evidence that he was the gold standard for personality, for interaction with spectators, for providing a moment to remember. And so we all remembered, and shed a tear or two, when the news – inevitable though still unexpected – came hours after Rory McIlroy won \$11.5 million for capturing both the Tour Championship and FedEx Cup in Atlanta.

Think that kind of money would not have been had Palmer not arrived on the scene in the mid-1950s, right when network television was in need of something to show besides opera and ballet on summery Sunday afternoons?

No. Without Palmer and his tryst with television – he married Winnie but also romanced the image orthicon cameras of CBS at Augusta

National – golf might still be a sport consigned to the back pages, no bigger than professional bowling. Delightful enough to play, but for \$100,000 purses and a

couple hours of the majors televised on weekend afternoons.

Arnold Palmer is directly responsible for the growth of golf in terms of players – doubled in the 1960s from five million to 10 million – as well as that decade's boom in course building, to say nothing of bringing the British Open back to relevance and eventually, once he turned 50, making the senior tour something to watch.

Speaking of something to watch, Palmer's partnering with businessman Joe Gibbs on a venture called Golf Channel opened doors and got the network precious space on cable and satellite TV when dozens of other channels foundered and faded to black.

All because he smiled, shook some hands, signed some autographs, and, in his day, hit the living hell out of the ball.

Arnold Palmer could play. He combined the power of a blacksmith – though things went haywire at the Olympic Club in 1966 – with the touch of a diamond-cutter on the greens.

Palmer hitting a shot out of trouble was dramatic. He'd come to the ball, look at the lie, hitch up his pants, toss away his cigarette, and belt it in the general direction of the green. The army would roar or groan, depending.

Meanwhile, squirrels and butterflies watched the rest of the field. As it later would be with Nicklaus or Trevino or Woods, the toughest tee time in golf was in the group following Arnold Palmer. It was like playing in the aftermath of a tornado.

Palmer made golf athletic, not technical in the sense of Ben Hogan or Byron Nelson. When Palmer made impact, he was as precise and technically accurate as the rest of them – there's really only one absolutely correct way to strike the ball – but getting there and after, Palmer was one of a kind.

He'd lash at it like he was cracking a whip, then come through with the helicopter finish that seemed to will the ball down the fairway. He hit low, darting shots that somehow were able to check up on greens. He took divots the size of small foundations. He kept course workers around for overtime to fill them on ranges.

You'd watch that swing, and the result, and think you could do that too.

He reveled in life. As Dan Jenkins famously said, "Nobody has enjoyed being someone more than Arnold Palmer enjoys being Arnold Palmer."

The first of his eight major championships was the 1954 U.S. Amateur, which he always considered the most important because it convinced him he could play as a pro. His last major victory was the 1964 Masters. It was televised in black-and-white. But through the next five decades, Palmer remained relevant because he remained approachable. Businesses recognized that, and until Tiger Woods came along, he was the top golfer in endorsement revenue.

Palmer didn't horde his money. The children's and women's hospitals named for him and Winnie in Orlando, Florida, his winter base, for which he led the fund-raising campaigns, may be his greatest legacy.

But he lived for golf, and even in his dotage, loved to play the game well. Sitting down with Jeff Rude for a *GOLFChicago* story a few years ago, Palmer bemoaned the state of his game.

"I played yesterday and I hate myself," he said, smiling. "It's very humiliating not to be able to play golf the way I once did.

"But it's better than being on the other side."

Next time you play, offer a toast in his memory. Make it an Arnold Palmer.

Distinguished Kingship

What made Arnold Palmer special as a golfer was his drive to prove himself to his father and his go-for-broke, aggressive style that coincided with the advent of the TV age. He was the right man at the right time.

What made him special as a person is that he always seemed to enjoy spending time with people, was always nice, and that also traces to his father, Deacon, the Latrobe, Pennsylvania, greenskeeper. He told me in a lengthy 2012 interview in his Bay Hill office, "You can be congenial and nice and it'll work. That's all I've ever done. My father always said to me, 'Don't be nasty. To anybody.' " Palmer pounded on his desk for effect, and then added, "So I practiced that, treating other people like you'd want to be treated."

While Palmer was in Cleveland for a senior tournament about three decades ago, golf writer George Sweda asked if the golfer would join him at his high school reunion to see what reaction they would get. Palmer obliged, and the two hopped into a courtesy car and went to the party for a few minutes. Previously, Palmer had joined Sweda in a Sears men's department to see if anyone would recognize him.

Another time, former *Golfweek* editor Dave Seanor asked if Palmer would say happy birthday to Seanor's father. So Palmer grabbed the cell phone and talked with the editor's father for several minutes, making the day of more than one man.

Palmer's longtime agent, Mark McCormack, thought Palmer overdid things and was too nice. As a college student covering the Western Open in Chicago in the mid-1960s, I saw Palmer's grace first hand. I did a 15-minute interview with him, only to discover I had not turned on the tape recorder. When Palmer learned of the problem, he told me "Turn it on and we'll do it again."

Point is, a lot of people could learn from Arnold Palmer's affable behavior.

Sand Valley: America's Next Great Golf Resort

Somehow, some way, America's next great golf resort is tucked away in the forests of Nekoosa, a short drive from Wisconsin Rapids. Golf course entrepreneur Mike Keiser of Bandon Dunes fame, located 1,700 acres

of the iceberg for the resort. "We plan to keep building courses until golfers tell us to stop," he says with a chuckle. While the course can play as long as 6,909 yards from the championship tees, fairways were built as firm and fast, thus allowing tee shots to gain additional yards. Most holes



of rolling sand dunes and turned one part over to the legendary design duo of Bill Coore and Ben Crenshaw. feature long stretches of waste bunkers and sand bunkers, which are visually stimulating and very challenging. The sandy soil lining fairways and tees teem with low lying vegetation, including heather, scrubby oaks and pines, bearberry, and blueberry.

In a course filled with memorable holes, the most memorable may be the 236-yard, par-3 No. 17, which calls for a tee shot toward a high crest and gives way to a downhill stretch that directs the tee shot toward the green.

It couldn't be better to be Mike Small these days. The coach of University of Illinois' men's golf team not only won the Illinois PGA Championship for a record-extending 12th

time – one off the national record held by Jim White of Nebraska. He also signed a new six-year contract with the university just before the 2016-17 school year opened.

It will pay Small more than \$2 million over the run of the deal through the 2021-22 campaign. That is a bargain when what his teams have accomplished are considered. They've won seven of the last eight Big Ten titles, won four straight NCAA regionals, are the only squad to advance to the NCAA's match-play finals format five times since it was introduced, and are the top team in the national rankings over the last seven years. The only thing missing is an NCAA title, and that could come as soon as next June, when the men's and women's championships are held at Rich Harvest Farms in Sugar Grove.

Birdies for Charity Fly High

Merit Club assistant pro Jim Billiter has won the Illinois PGA Match Play and Illinois PGA Section titles in the last three years, but he scored an even bigger victory for charity on September 6 by finishing first in the Illinois PGA Birdies for Charity fundraiser at River Forest Country Club.

Thanks to his skill – scoring 28 birdies and a hole-in-one – across the marathon 72-hole day, and the largess of his membership, Billiter raised almost \$35,000 of the record \$232,000 total from the 34-player field.

Eclectic Group Paced International

Cully Johnston, who plays guitar as well or better than he plays golf, captured the International Amateur at Robert A. Black Golf Course on September 10-11.

Johnston's score of plus-48 in the modified Stableford format earned him the title by five points over big hitter Steve Kois of Wheaton. Both trailed Rob Bruce of River Forest after Saturday's first round, but overcame that with solid play on Sunday.

Johnston, 37, plays in the group Sequoia when he's not on the course or working behind the scenes at Second City. Two years ago, he qualified for the U.S. Mid-Amateur.

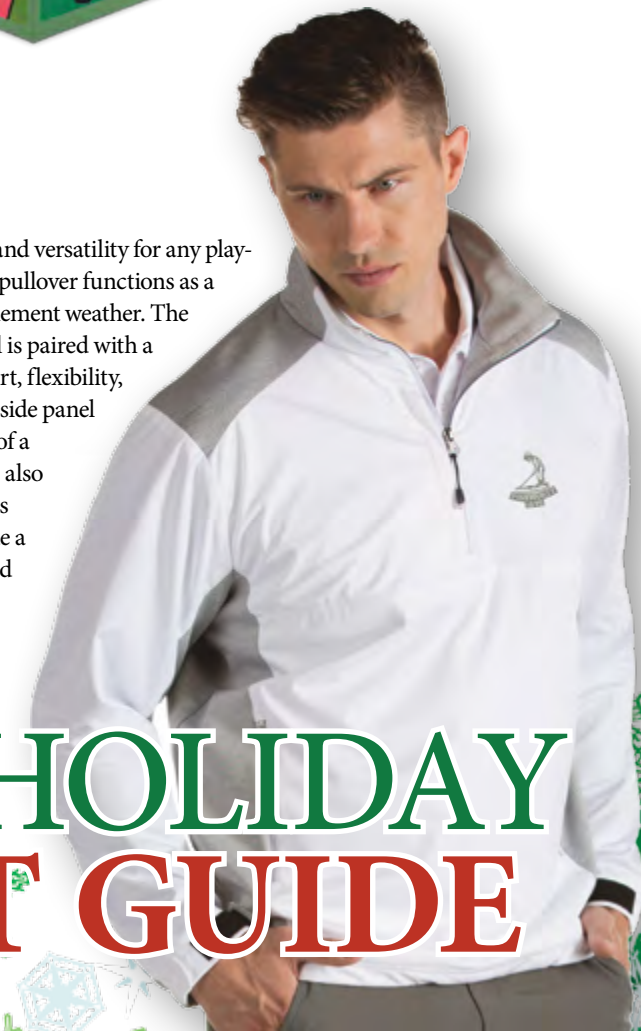

Being inspired by your surroundings while golfing is one of the most relaxing feelings... especially when you're playing well.

St. George, Utah is quickly becoming the new tradition for destination golf trips, and it's easy to see why. Impressive courses, intriguing terrain and inviting rates are sure to impress your golf group.

By now you've probably heard of the Red Rock Golf Trail with it's 10 amazing courses, like Sand Hollow, Coral Canyon and The Ledges, just to name a few. That's 189 holes to get your game on. Oh, and not to mention they're open for play 365 days a year. Off season? No such thing in St. George.

With daily flights into St. George on Delta, United and American Airlines or just 90 minutes north of Las Vegas on I-15, getting there couldn't be easier. Going home...well, that may take some convincing.

You've played the same old courses and been to the typical desert golf destinations countless times. It's time to revitalize your game on the Red Rock Golf Trail in St. George, Utah.

Area Courses

Sand Hollow Golf Club has it's own standard for unique course design that includes an 18 hole championship track as well as a walkable 9 hole links style course. Have you ever played golf on a cliff? Well, get ready because on this John Fought course, you might find yourself teeing one off over the edge just to see how far you can make it fly.

Coral Canyon Golf Club is all about the colors. You will be amazed at how green the fairways are in this rustic desert. The fairways here are wide and nicely forgiving – so go ahead, flex your muscles and go for your longest drive. The most common thing golfers say about Coral Canyon is just how fun it is. Golf? Fun? Hmm, now there's an idea.

The Ledges Golf Club comes with unique views of it's own. The red rock panoramas from the rim of Snow Canyon State Park make you feel like you're playing golf in a postcard. Designed by renowned golf course architect Matt Dye this course has a friendly atmosphere with an upscale pro shop and delightful restaurant.

Falcon Ridge Golf Club is another desert gem on the Red Rock Golf Trail. Just 40 minutes south of St. George, it's totally worth the drive. This course has so many water features you'll forget you're golfing in the desert. With all its elevated tee boxes you'll see a side of golf you've never seen before.

Sky Mountain is as scenic as it is challenging. The course is appropriately named for the amazing views from the elevated tee boxes. Don't be

surprised if you find yourself gazing off at the cliffs of Zion National Park and the azure rim of the Pine Valley Mountains in the distance. Anywhere you look and anytime you play, it's simply gorgeous!

Sunbrook Golf Club is right in town and has a great variety of what the Red Rock Golf Trail has to offer. Play from the top of the bluffs to the desert floor. Shoot through black lava rock and try to avoid the red sand traps. There is even a par 3 island hole that will leave you dreaming about a hole in one.

Green Spring Golf Club is a favorite among locals and guests. Holes 5 and 6 have you shooting across red rock ravines that will get your heart racing. There is plenty of water here to have fun with, especially on number 15. You might find yourself wanting to tee off a couple extra balls just to see if you can cut the corner to the green

Southgate can be a walkable course for those looking to mix a little exer-

cise in with their golf game. This is a "doable" course that weaves alongside the Santa Clara river – just close enough to make it beautiful and keep the game interesting. Eight of the first nine holes have water features, so you've got to be accurate. But the fairways are wide, so there's usually a safe place to play.

St. George Golf Club is another course you won't want to miss. Open since 1976, this course is a local tradition with large greens that make for long and rewarding putts. It's another great course to walk to mix a little exercise in with your game. There are three par 3's over water that you'll have fun with, along with a couple holes where the greens are on a small peninsula.

Dixie Red Hills is the pioneer of St. George golf, opening for play in the mid 1960's. If you want to play in the red rocks, you can't get any closer than this. You'll

be calling shots off the boulders, around the cliffs and through the trees as you find your way to the green. The fairways are lined with large cottonwood trees which are great for shade and keeping your game on track. It's a perfect place for a quick nine holes right in the heart of St. George.

Data-Driven Swing

Earlier this year our technology spotlight featured the Garmin Approach S20 watch. A wearable golf GPS that had other great features such as a pedometer (links to My Fitness Pal) and notifications from your smartphone. One of the best options included with the Approach S20, however, is the ability to pair with the Garmin TruSwing. The device, which collects a slew of data about your golf swing, has become one of the hottest analyzers in what is a crowded market.

If you read my piece on the Approach S20 watch [May 2016], you'll remember my initial hesitation of wearing a device on my wrist and how it would affect my swing. A feeling that was debunked after one round of golf. In fact, I haven't played a single round in 2016 without wearing the watch. I'm a changed man. I had similar thoughts on clipping a device to the shaft of my golf club for analysis purposes. How would it affect the weight of the club and would I swing differently because of that?

One of the first things I noticed, though, was how the TruSwing is virtually

weightless. At .98 ounces, the sensor has zero disruption to your swing. Think the exact opposite of one of those security sensors that retailers attach to drivers. The TruSwing clips just under your grip and it will never loosen.

The great thing about this particular device is that you can practice with it on the range or in your backyard. So if you don't have the extra time to commit to a bucket of balls, you can still get details and analysis about your swing. Metrics that the TruSwing takes into account include: tempo, swing speed, face angle, dynamic loft, shaft angle, club path, and shaft lean. In other words, it lets you get away with nothing. Ultimately, the goal is to see how your mechanics affect your ball flight and shot results.

After your practice session, you'll log in to Garmin Connect, the free app that pairs with all Garmin devices. This is where your data will land and guide you to a better swing. One of the best places to start is comparing your most recent practice session to the last one. Connecting TruSwing to Garmin Connect will give you real-time, 3-D swing animations for an easy visual of your progress. My main takeaway from the Garmin Connect analysis was that there were flaws within my swing that I had either never noticed, or never knew how bad they were. One example was that my shaft angle was a bit out of whack, which was having an impact on how much lag I had in my downswing. Once I accessed the 3-D animations and saw where I needed to be, I was able to achieve a near optimum shaft angle, which lead to 15 more yards on my drives! Similar results with my irons have now made me change which club I use at a particular distance. I also found the tempo and club-path numbers extremely useful.

As with all of the latest tech items I consider, I key in on battery life. It's a non-negotiable for me, because I'm always the guy that forgets to plug his stuff in, rendering it

useless when it comes time to actually use it. The TruSwing had an impressive battery life of about 15 hours in my testing, which is three hours better than what Garmin promotes on their website.

When I take into account the ease of use, zero maintenance, and overall results of the Garmin TruSwing, I'd be lying if I said it wasn't the best swing analyzer I've tried. www.garmin.com \$149.99

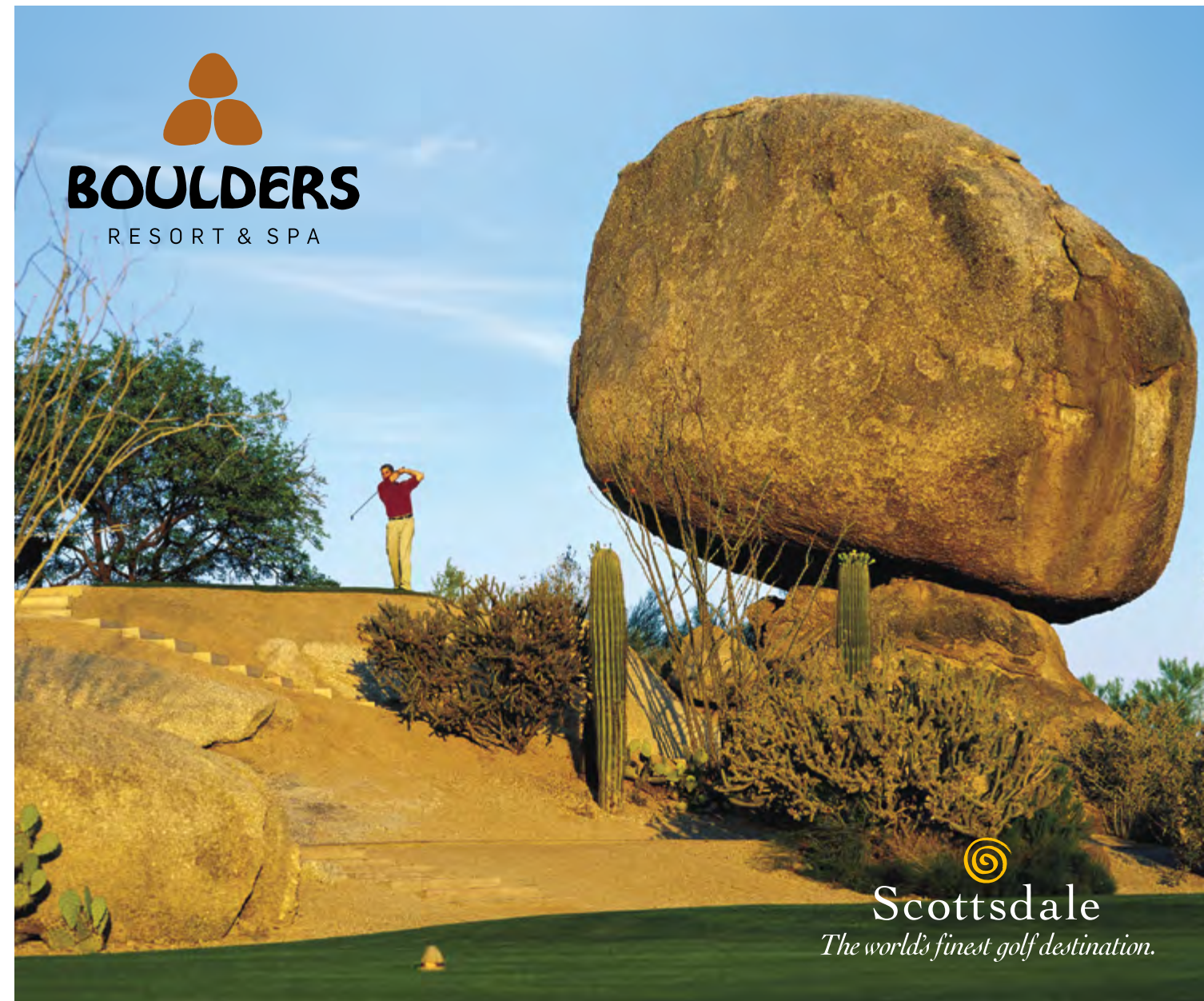

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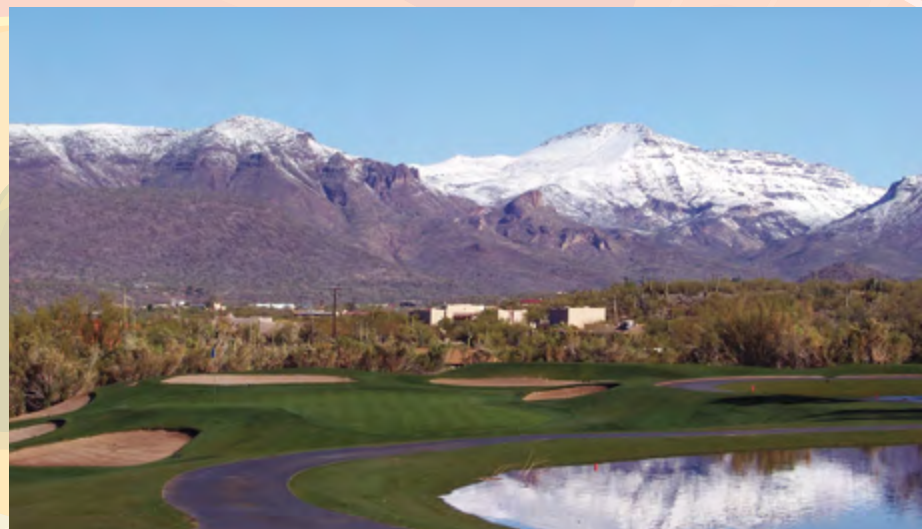

Most holes don't have extensively long forced carries from the tees, and the same is true for nearly all the greens that are accepting of low-bouncing shots hit short of the green. The course was also selected as being in the top 10 courses in Arizona by *Ranking Arizona* magazine during the same year.

The 19th hole is usually of equal importance to the golf course itself for any golf experience, and the Tonto Bar and Grill is only a few short steps away and captures the rustic desert ambiance of years gone by with hand-carved beams of the historic ranch ceiling still in place. With two dining areas inside and a covered patio overlooking the 11th green, the facility certainly provides a cozy spot to relax after an enjoyable day on the links.

In addition to offering cold beverages, great care is taken to ensure the menu is second to none and that it fully embraces the local flavors of the southwest. Chef Eric Flatt and his staff also aim to preserve Arizona's heritage through our cuisine and by sharing the stories of our property's past. They fuse Southwestern and Native American ingredients and present them in a warm, welcoming atmosphere rich in Arizona lore. Many areas of the restaurant feature historic photos of the property from the years as one of Arizona's most successful dude ranches in the 1940s.

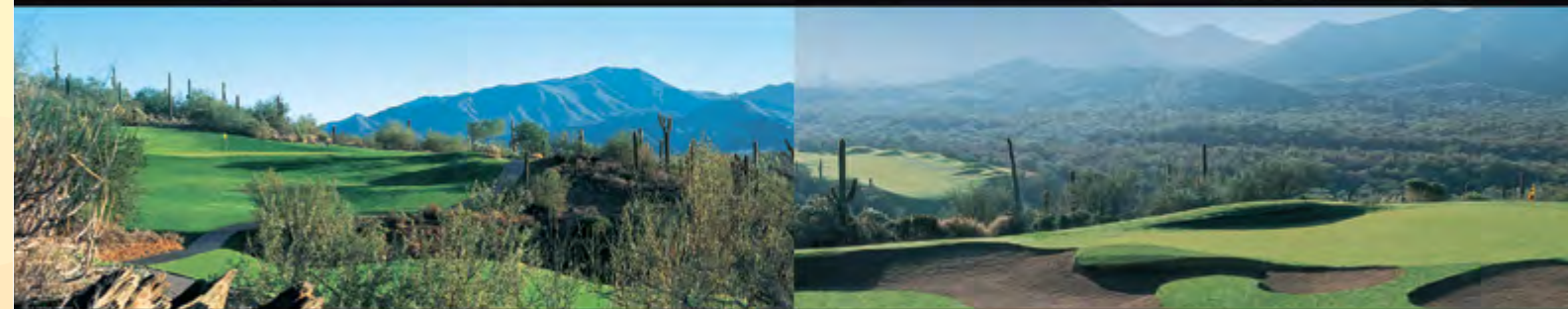

PGA Tour player/architect Tom Lehman gets extremely excited when it comes to his 10th golf course in Arizona — Victory at Verrado Golf Club. Sporting breath-taking views from the base of the White Tank Mountains in the West Valley, Victory is the main amenity of the 55-plus adult community being created by Scottsdale-based DMB, one of the premiere master planned developers in the country.

“Every hole kind of gives you something unique and different, with that theme of being a in surreally beautiful, rugged rock environment with immaculately maintained fairways and greens running through-out,” Lehman said of Victory, a 7,100-yard, par-72 layout that will open to the public in December.

“We’ve truly used whatever the land has given us — if that’s a cliff or a nob or a boulder or a drop-off or a sudden rise up the mountain — and left the terrain all natural, so it looks like it’s been built right into the land. In fact, I can’t think of any other golf course in Arizona that is quite like it. It just looks so compelling that I’m sure it will be quite an experience for those who play it.”

“Playability will be a major factor when it comes to enjoying Victory,” said Lehman. “There’s no reason to beat people up with an overly tough golf course,” added Lehman, comparing Verrado to courses he encounters as a professional golfer.

“Seriously, there are so many awesome holes in between (the start and finish) that I just love it,” he said of Victory, which features 85 acres of turf, a minimal amount of bunkering and greens that range in size from 4,500 square feet up to a massive 8,000 square feet.

Victory will be the Lehman Design Group’s 30th project overall, meaning a course it has done from the very beginning or has renovated. According to Lehman, the new course

unfolds quickly, with a one-of-a-kind rock outcropping defining the greens at No. 1 and 2, and then builds to a crescendo at the 17th and 18th holes, which just happen to be the remnants of a deep basin, or pit, that was once the testing grounds for heavy-duty machinery built by Caterpillar.

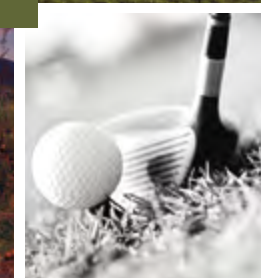
Lehman called the final hole “a thing of beauty” right down to the lush grape vines and orchards that weave together to form its backdrop. And the variety and views just keep on coming, he added.

“For instance, I think the ninth hole, which is blessed with this amazing vista, will eventually be regarded as one of the best par 4s in Phoenix. Overall, it’s going to be mostly all fairway, with greens that flow up and through and with all kinds of movement – humps and bumps and all that kind of stuff. But very natural and without a lot of bunkers, so it looks like we just set the golf course in there.”

Victory becomes the second 18-hole championship golf course created for the Verrado Community. Verrado Golf Club opened in January of 2004 and through the years has become one of the Valley’s most highly regarded layouts. Lehman and his former partner John Fought can take credit for that spectacular layout, which has garnered accolades from numerous national golf publications.

Most recently, *GolfWeek’s* list of “Top 100 Courses You Can Play” ranked Verrado as the No. 4 layout in Arizona. Both Verrado and Victory are located near Buckeye, Arizona, just a short drive from downtown Phoenix, Sky Harbor International Airport or Scottsdale.

There's an App for That

My plants are dying, I need to drink more water!"

I heard this statement while entering my house a few weeks ago. I am frequently clueless about conversations in my house, but this one was a bit strange. My wife and daughter explained they had downloaded the app Plant Nanny to help keep them to track their hydration. Drink enough water and your plants grow and bring joy to your life. Jawbone, and Misfit. Do a little research to find the fitness tracker that is best for you. They tend to be slightly more accurate than the apps, but you may also pay significantly more as prices range from \$30 to \$250 dollars.

To improve overall strength and core stability, find a workout and exercise app. There are many choices regarding the type of exercise and the level of sweat you want to generate. Most apps have beginner to advanced routines, so consider the level of exercise you have performed recently and also any health issues that may affect your exercise tolerance. Start slow and gradually increase to avoid excessive soreness or injury.

Golf apps are available for download that offer golf specific exercise routines and swing advice. Golf Fit Pro, NG 360, and Fitivity are a few of the golf apps available. Several of the apps have the capability to track your rounds and monitor progress, in addition to the fitness routines, to help build motivation as your scores drop.

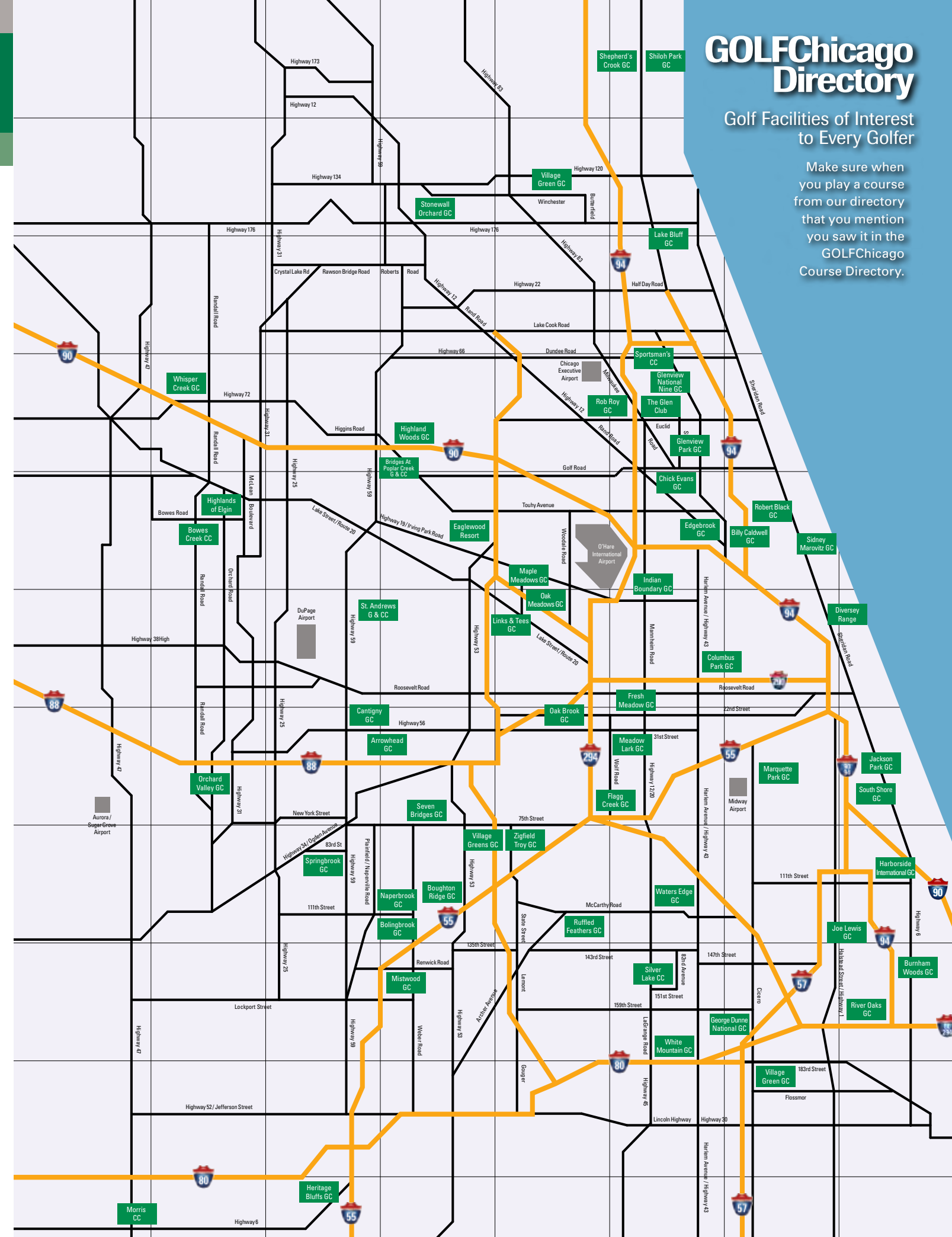

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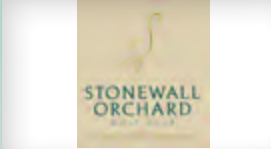

Through it all, he collected an all-star team and continues to nurture and cultivate his idea of Linksoul. Ashworth believes that the game of golf truly links souls together, which is reflected in the brand's classic stylings.

GOLFChicago: What is Linksoul?

John Ashworth: Linksoul is more of a philosophy than a brand. It is the collective life's work of a group of people that care about each other and enjoy collaborating. We believe in making things with our hands, with the people we love, for the good of our families and our surroundings.

GC: How would you describe individuals who select Linksoul?

JA: Our clients are conscious of how they look and feel. They want quality. Our clothing appeals to men who are looking for a style that is relevant without going over the top. A relaxed style that is transitional and can be worn to several occasions and social settings where it will feel comfortable in each place.

GC: Where do you get your inspiration for new clothing designs?

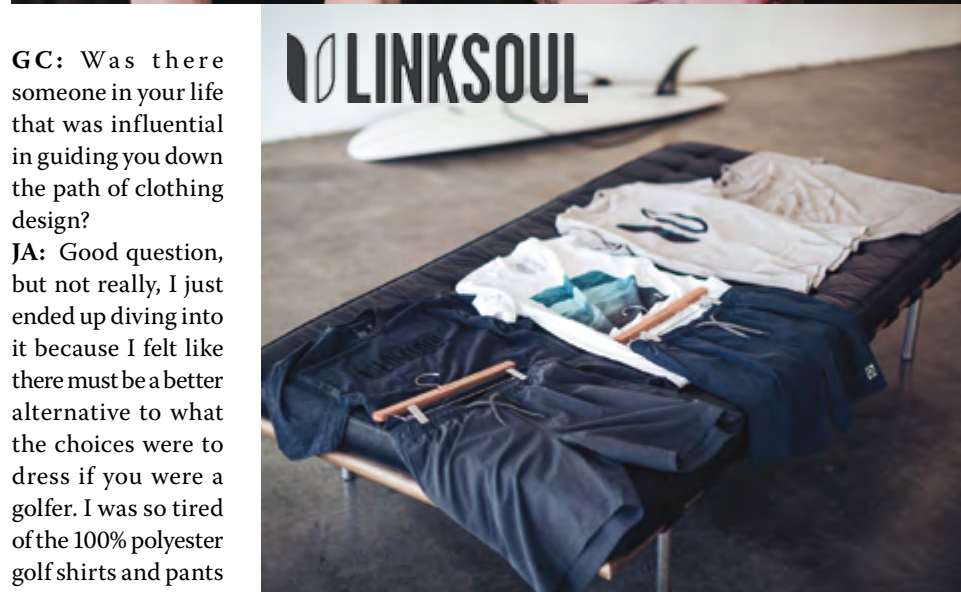
JA: Inspiration comes from anywhere and everywhere if you are open to it. Inspiration comes in bundles, especially when traveling. Our senses seem to be open up more when seeing new sights, new cultures, new colors, and that all tends to influence the creative process and will get worked into our collections.

GC: What do you want to convey through your materials, patterns, and styles?

JA: We look for fabrics that have an ease of motion and a soft feel that is comfortable to the skin and the touch. We look for fabrics that are easy to care for and are mainly natural or blends with technical properties that will be better performance for a majority of climates. As far as patterns go, we generally use subtle prints and colors that come from nature. We spend a lot of time on how things fit. We want a fit that is just right, not too loose but not too tight either.

GC: Was there someone in your life that was influential in guiding you down the path of clothing design?

JA: Good question, but not really, I just ended up diving into it because I felt like there must be a better alternative to what the choices were to dress if you were a golfer. I was so tired of the 100% polyester golf shirts and pants at the time. None of the clothing could be worn in the real world, and that was the inspiration: to make clothing that was comfortable on the golf course and could transition to the street and places in between.

GC: What is next for your brand?

JA: Together, after years of conceptualizing, collecting, developing, and designing, we are very pleased to birth Linksoul.

After several laps around the track, we are looking to expand beyond the current definitions of "business as usual" when it comes to making and selling goods and participating as a socially and environmentally responsible company within the community. It is no longer just about golf, it is about everything. But golf is still mandatory on Fridays.

In 1893, Luigi Cecchi became a professional wine taster. Although widespread in Europe, the craft of "palatista (taster)" was still unknown in Italy. However, Cecchi believed that by approaching Italian wines with professionalism and organization, people in Italy as well as elsewhere would be able to recognize the quality of the wines produced.

In the early 1900s, Luigi's son Cesare joined him in business, founding the "Cecchi" label, hoping to prosper both at home and abroad. Luigi, the founder's grandson, was the key figure during the time of third-generation innovation and expansion. With him, the Cecchi brand distinguished itself in the domestic wine industry thanks to new technologies, a search for new territories, and an intuition for business. Today Andrea and Cesare Cecchi lead the company, a fourth-generation with undiminished enthusiasm. These two brothers have focused their attention on productive sustainability and on the ability of the wine produced to express its territory of origin.

In Tuscany's Maremma Toscana DOC, on the upper third of Italy's western coast, virgin forests that border with ancient churches and enchanting villages are the prevalent backdrops to slopes on which the grapevines grow. It is a unique environment where the Cecchi family works with the natural cycles of the seasons. Respecting the ecosystem has accompanied the growth of the winery, and today a minimal environmental impact is an ongoing goal.

At Cecchi, "sustainability" takes on a real and proactive character driven by three well-defined policies: the defense and improvement of winery lands, agriculture, and environment; recycling; and using new technology that allows for the minimization of energy consumption and natural resources necessary for production. Water was one of the first natural resources the winery was concerned about. This explains the longtime presence of an innovative system of constructed wetlands for the treatment of wastewater from the winery centers in Chianti and of the Maremma, providing natural water flows and a safeguard for the environment.

2014 La Mora Vermentino \$13
Mora means "horse" in Italian, a tribute to the cattle-herding cowboys that historically

lived in the Maremma region. This lemon-hued wine offers a nose of flowers and sweet citrus. This sense continues on the palate, adding just a hint of white peach. La Mora is light and approachable, with a short finish.

This wine will go nicely with Baked Oysters with Oil and Parsley, Fricassee Chicken with Egg and Lemon, or Sauteed Snapper with Mushrooms. ■■■■■
2012 Chianti Classico \$17
This Sangiovese is dark garnet in the glass. It opens with a solid cherry nose and a hint of earth and spice. The flavor profile features tart plum, cocoa, and cinnamon, supported by smooth tannins and ending in a medium-long finish.

Enjoy this Italian with Fava Beans with Artichokes and Peas, Rabbit with Rosemary and White Wine, or Tuscan Meat Roll with White Wine and Porcini Mushrooms. ■■■■■



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It's Not a Major Anymore

Entering the 1964 Western Open, Juan "Chi Chi" Rodriguez was known as the golfer who, when he got on a hot streak, was considered by some a "hot dog."

If the 28-year-old Puerto Rican made a long putt for a birdie, he might throw his hat over the hole to keep it there, or wield his putter like a sword and engage in a duel with an imaginary foe.

Galleries loved it. Some fellow competitors did not, especially the hat routine, which he eventually abandoned.

But all stood in admiration when Rodriguez put together four rounds in the 60s at Tam O'Shanter to capture the Western with an aggregate score of 16-under-

par 268, a record for Tam by a stroke – Byron Nelson had held it – and matching the all-time Western Open mark. And he needed every saved stroke, for right behind him at 269 was the defending champion, Arnold Palmer, whose huge galleries were with the King all the way. (And Jack Nicklaus tied for third.)

Like so many All-American Opens and World Championships in Tam's heyday, it came down to the course's back nine. He was a stroke behind Palmer at the turn, but four birdies, combined with Palmer's lipped-out birdie attempt at the 16th and a bogey at the 17th, set the stage for the last. That's where Chi Chi, shortsided in a greenside bunker, plopped his bunker shot four feet from the cup and knocked it in for the saving par that earned him the record-tying first prize of \$11,000.

"I thought I was going to hold out from the trap," Rodriguez said. "It was the longest four-foot putt I ever saw in my life."

Rodriguez won seven other times on the regular tour, but the Western was his biggest triumph, for the Western Open's aura still placed the championship well above the run-of-the-mill tournaments sponsored by brewers, casinos, and widget manufacturers. Years later, he still kidded about it.

"Before I won the Western Open, it was considered a major championship," Chi Chi quipped. "Then I won and they said it wasn't a major anymore."

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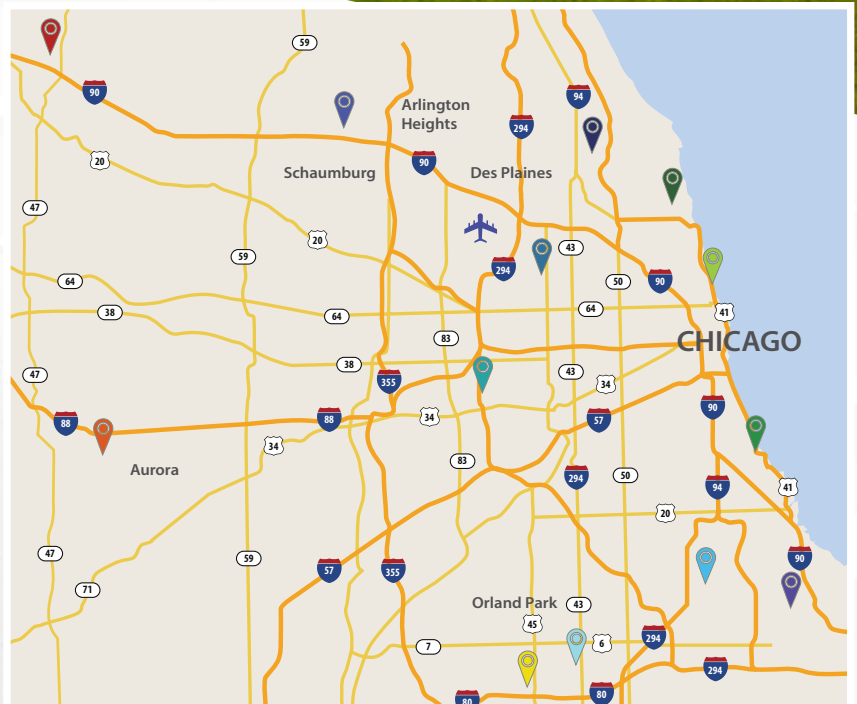
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
