

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

Lag Your Way to Better Scores

hree-putting is an absolute waste of strokes, and it is so discouraging that it can ruin not only your scores but also your attitude. Ever meet a happy three-putter? While three-putting is nearly impossible to avoid completely, especially on today's faster greens, most amateurs do it far more often than they should. With the help of the PGA Tour's ShotLink tracking system, the Pelz Golf Institute has found that weekend players drop a stroke by three-putting up to six times as often as professionals do.

Even scratch amateurs three-putt more than once every 10 holes and, as you can guess, the frequency of three-putting increases with handicap. If you're a 30-handicapper, you're literally throwing away three or four strokes every round you play.

It's interesting to compare your three-putt percentage to that of the best players in the world. The difference is crazy! ShotLink data from 2013 tells us that PGA Tour pros three-putt an average of 2.4 times—per event! And so far this year there have been eight tournament winners who didn't three-putt once en route to victory.

If pros can avoid three-putting, so can you, because you don't need a ton of athletic ability to get down in two. Avoiding three-putting doesn't even require a ton of practice. You just have to get your first putts to stop a little closer to the hole than they have in the past.

My advice is to change your approach on long lags, which amateurs typically leave too short, for an easy two-putt. Try the following two changes:



- 1. Stand closer to the ball and with an open stance. This allows you to look out at the putt with binocular vision, which helps with depth perception. Looking at the putt like this also frees up your motion to provide more power to the ball.
- 2. Putt with a chipping stroke, not a putting stroke. Add a little wrist hinge both back and through. Again, this will help you avoid hitting the ball too softly and coming up short.

Next time you play, give these two lagputt keys a try. They'll help you reduce the number of times you three-putt during a round. Obviously, strokes are precious, and avoiding three-putting is an easy way to save them.





Stop Swinging on a Single Axis

f you're having trouble making solid contact with the ball, you might be swinging around the wrong axis. One of the biggest, and most prevalent, myths in the history of golf is the concept of swinging around a single axis, your spine.

This is the imaginary line that starts from the top of your head and extends on is your legs, the only thing actually in every athletic motion and in every sport. through the center of your body (your spine) to the ground. If you can picture a tether pole and ball, the ball is attached

to the pole via the rope. This is a good example of something swinging around a single axis. This may make sense at first glance, but it is littered with serious biomechanical impossibilities and swing

What you really want to turn around contact with the ground. There are actually two axes you need to turn on in the golf swing. In order to get your upper body

behind the ball without swaying on the backswing, you simply move your upper body around your right leg. To get the weight "transferring" towards the target your weight needs to shift to the left leg so the right hip can finish the swing.

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
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A Hero Complex and the Buried Lie

You are about to make an 8 during a great round of golf. There is a feeling of dread as you prepare to taint an otherwise pretty scorecard. After this winter, we have all had enough snow, so let's talk about avoiding snowmen.

Picture this: you just hit a shot off to the side of a green and you find yourself in the kind of lie that looks like one of your friends has stepped on it and given the surrounding turf a fluff. You sigh as you face an egg of a lie in an undesirable Easter basket. Upon your desperate efforts to stay positive in this situation, you realize that the pin is close to your side of the green. Let's keep going. The shot must carry a bunker and there is water on the other side of the green. The

green is also sloping away from you. You are about to make 8!

There are a couple of things to consider when you are presented with a situation that can blow-up a scorecard. First, you have a decision to make. Do you take your medicine, or try to be the hero? Think about the likelihood of saving this par. Also consider the possibility of ruining an otherwise good round if you fail to execute. Sometimes, hard as it is to swallow, you have to take your medicine.

Try to figure out if you can just get the ball somewhere on the putting surface, even if you have to aim away from the pin. A two-putt from here avoids the big score. If you have to hit it high, trying to be a hero or not, the common fault I see is golfers falling onto their back foot while hitting this shot. It is a common fault whenever recreational players are trying to hit the ball high. Instinctively, it would seem that if you lean back, the ball should go higher. The problem is that this makes your front shoulder higher than your back shoulder, which is excellent for driving from a tee, yet yields terrible results when you are trying to get under a ball that is at ground level. When the club swings upward and follows your shoulder line, then you are likely to take out any fellow competitors in its path with an unintentional low flying missile.

Use this approach when you face this difficult situation: pick a line of play that

doesn't require such a high risk shot, even if it is away from the pin. Make sure you finish the shot with your weight on your front foot, and finish with your back foot on the tip of the toe. This will make your shoulders turn more level with the ground and make it possible for the club to get under the ball. Remember, the loft of your club will get the ball in the air and your snowman will melt right in front of your eyes! Remember, if you find yourself in a situation that could make your scorecard "sick," then take your medicine and let the healing begin. Sometimes a course-management remedy is less painful

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Golfers tend to get lazy with their legs and lead with the shoulders and hands, creating inconsistent ball contact and direction. This is partially due to timing and tempo, but also due to weakness in the trunk, shoulders, and hips. An example of this is young golfers that tend to have big looping swings, but very little body control because their trunk muscles have not fully developed. The following exercises focus on strengthening your hip, shoulder, and trunk rotators through a controlled range of movement. As you are doing the exercises

focus on these muscle groups along with the timing of your swing.


For the first exercise, attach the band to an object that will not move and stand a distance far enough away to put a moderate stretch on the band. The starting position is with your weight shifted towards the back leg and shoulders rotated as you would for a ¾-strength swing. Then drive forward, with your focus on tightening the buttock muscles of the back leg and the abdominal muscles. When you start to rotate your trunk as you would during your swing, the band will wrap around your body adding resistance. (left-hand picture). Try this with extended arms if you want to increase focus to the shoulder and upper back muscles.

The second exercise, an essential for any strengthening program, is a standing row. The exercise will strengthen the upper back and shoulder muscles, giving you the ability to stabilize your trunk and shoulders for all swings and putts. Attach the band to a stable object as in the first exercise. Stand facing the band with your feet shoulder-width apart and arm extended. Then pull the band back with both hands to your belt line above your hips while squeezing the shoulder blades together (right-hand picture). Be careful to pull your shoulders in a back and downward motion. Try to avoid an upward shrug motion. For a challenge, add a backward lunge while you do the exercise to address the leg muscles.



If you don't already have an exercise program, they are a good place to start. Now that the golf season is starting, be sure to grab a set of resistance bands and prepare your body for a great golf season.

Renovation Completed at Village Links

The common saying; "an oldie but a goodie" can mean different things to different people. When you apply that saying to The Village Links of Glen Ellyn it should be re-tooled to say, "an oldie, but the oldie can still take me to town."

Since 1967, The Village Links has been a staple in the Chicagoland golf scene. The course held over 25 Western Open General Qualifiers from the 80s to the early 2000s. In addition, Village Links has hosted U.S. Open Sectional Qualifiers five times (as recently as 2012) and remains a standard of championship golf in the Midwest. When you have an 18-hole course that stretches over 7,000 yards, it allows you accomplish some great things.

In order to continue providing a great overall experience for patrons, Village Links

underwent a \$6.2 million renovation that has its regulars ecstatic and new business flocking. Included in the renovation was a complete overhaul of the clubhouse, new parking lot, two new practice tees, and improvements to the driving range.

"We always wanted to work on the clubhouse and driving range," said general manager Matt Pekarek. "When the financial crash hit and the industry changed we weren't able to do it. So what we've done now is combine a lot of projects in one shot, and what we've ended up with are some great changes to the facilities."

Pekarek knows a thing or two about change around Village Links. He has been with the course since it opened (actually, the week before) and has been the general manager

since 1984. Pekarek also oversaw the golf course's renovations in 2004.


"On the golf side, we made a much larger tee for the driving range, expanding it on both ends," said Pekarek. "We added an artificial turf tee line which will allow for better conditions in the spring and during inclement weather. Adding that to an 18-hole and a 9-hole golf course I feel really makes us a golfer's community."

Financially speaking, it's also what's on the inside that counts. Village Links' clubhouse renovation included a modern banquet facility and restaurant under the name Reserve 22. The banquet side can now hold up to 150 people for a golf outing or wedding. The restaurant side provides enough tap beers

and flat screens you'll quickly forget that

is no stranger to the top golfers in the Midwest. 2014 will be no exception when Village Links hosts the U.S. Senior Open Qualifying on June 23rd. Pekarek foresees a CDGA setup that will mirror that of what the players will see at Oak Tree National come July.

"We're expecting around 60 to 90 golfers with only two or three spots being available," said Pekarek. "The one thing I'm most proud of is how our grounds staff got us through such a harsh winter. The course is in great shape and we're looking forward to some great competition in June."





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Palm Springs Celebrated As World's Golf Capital

et's face facts. Palm Springs is to golf what Las Vegas is to gambling and what New Orleans is to Cajun cuisine. While praise is rightly heaped on the Grand Strand in Myrtle Beach and the Golf Gulf Coast in Mississippi, and the desert delights of Scottsdale, Arizona, there is, was and will always be only one "Golf Capital of the World." Drive virtually anywhere across the highways and byways of the Coachella Valley and you'll encounter one of over 130 golf courses that dot this sun-kissed desert landscape. Quality goes hand in hand with quantity here with designs by some of the game's premier names, including Pete Dye, Jack Nicklaus, Greg Norman, Nick Faldo, and Arnold Palmer. Combine the great golf courses with a mean average temperature of 74.6°F and over 300 days of sunshine per year, and you acquire a keen understanding of why over three million people visit Palm Springs annually.



While some of these visitors come for the luxury resort accommodations, the swimming pools, the horseback riding and the celebrity sightings, golf has been a major area attraction since back in the days when Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, Bob Hope, and Elizabeth Taylor cemented the reputation of Palm Springs as an A-list desert hideaway. As the story goes, many actors under Hollywood contract had to be available within two hours of the studio as a precaution for last minute film or photo shoots. This community is a little over 100 miles from the hustle and bustle of Los Angeles.

While many of the classic golf courses for the celebrated past remain, new layouts were added at a breakneck pace during the golf boom years. The major golf resorts that lure players to the Great Palm Springs area include PGA West, Westin Mission Hills Resort, La Quinta Resort and Club, and Indian Wells Golf Resort.



Desert Willow Golf Resort

While first-time guests might not be familiar with this 36-hole property, Desert Willow epitomizes all that's great about Palm Springs golf. Perfectly manicured fairways and bunkers are interspersed with desert vegetation and lakes at the base of the majestic Santa Rosa mountain range. There's even a Chicago connection to the golf offerings, which are managed by Kemper Sports. The Firecliff course opened in 1997 and was. Designed by the team of Dr. Michael Hurdzan, Dana Fry, and PGA Tour champion John Cook, the 7,056-yard course features extensive natural areas and over 100 sand bunkers and waste areas. Voted the area's best public-access golf course for three years in a row by Desert Golf magazine, the course is not for the faint of heart nor the errant-off-the-tee. Trouble in the form of the aforementioned sand and waste areas lurks on most every hole. The 410-yard No. 2 features vegetated desert on both sides of a wide fairway, along with a large clover-shaped sand bunker on the right side of the tee shot landing area. From the fairway, the approach shot must avoid a greenside bunker protecting the right of the hole and more desert landscape to the left and beyond the flagstick.

Those looking for a slightly less intimidating challenge will enjoy the 6,913-yard Mountain View course which plays to a down right polite 6,470 yards from the blue tees. Sharing the Firecliff course's design team, this classicallystyled track features ample amounts of sand bunkers and water, but most green sites allow for bump-and-run play. An exception to that rule is the 6th hole, a par 5 that calls for a driver and lay-



up short of a rock-lined creek that circles around the front and left side of the green. A good second shot here leads to a shortiron approach and a chance at a birdie.


Need some help with those short-iron approach shots? The Desert Willow- Golf Academy maintains a full staff to help sharpen even rusty games. Director of Instruction Paul Bucy stresses golf fitness along with computer swing analysis and innovative swing drills.

PGA West

Many golf fans were introduced to PGA West when the resort's TPC Stadium course

hosted the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic back in 1987, when then Speaker of the House Tip O'Neill needed a handful of swings to extract his ball from the course's 19-foot deep 16th hole sand bunker. Chicago Tribune golf writer Bob Verdi described the course a year later as "a brute of 7,271 yards with water





hazards big enough to require lifeguards and traps containing more sand than Egypt. You don't hire a caddy there, you hire a camel." Course architect Pete Dve seems to welcome the criticism. "Golf is not a fair game, so why build a course fair?" The course has today been stretched to 7,300 vards and has the highest stroke rating (76.1) of all the courses at PGA West. The layout is annual host to the PGA Tour's qualifying school finals and is rated among the "Top 100 Courses in the in California, Indian Wells serves up two great World" by Golf magazine. The elegant PGA West Resort is home

to six golf courses in total, including three that are only accessible to members. The PGA Tour's Humana Challenge is played over two of these—the Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer private courses. Along with the aforementioned TPC Stadium Course, the resort's other public offerings are the Nicklaus Tournament Course and the Greg Norman Resort Course. Both are outstanding.

Hyatt Regency Indian Wells Resort & Spa

Golfers looking for extra pampering should consider booking their stay at this elegant property. Along with 530 deluxe rooms with garden, mountain, golf or pool views, the resort offers a spa and salon, seven swimming pools (including an adult pool with cabanas), tennis, biking, badminton and table tennis courts, along with multiple dining options. The Hyatt's two golf courses are perennially ranked by national golf magazines among the top 20 courses to play 18-hole championship courses. The Players Course was designed by John Fought and stretches to 7,300 yards. The resort touts the course, which was host to the 2008 LG Skins Game, as a "core golf" layout with no roads or homes intruding anywhere in the vicinity of the player.

The Celebrity Course was opened in 2006 to rave reviews and features water in all forms—brooks, streams, split-level lakes and even waterfalls.

Guests staying at the resort also enjoy exclusive privileges to schedule tee times at the private Indian Wells Country Club. The course was the original home to the PGA's Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Indian Wells is also renowned as one of the world's premier tennis destinations. The Hvatt Regency Indian Wells Resort & Spa is the former home of the Newsweek Champions Cup. Tennis offerings include three hard-surface courts, tennis instruction and a pro shop.

Desert Springs

This outstanding property serves up 36 holes of championship golf. Both the Palm and Valley courses are family-friendly, as holes provide open tee shot landing areas and open routes to greens. Most every hole provides panoramic views of the Santa Rosa mountain range. Both courses are certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary, which means that there's plenty of flora and fauna to enjoy but, alas, also that certain areas of the property don't allow for ball retrieval. So take extra ammunition!

The Palm course recently received \$1.5 million in renovations, including spectacular white sand bunkers. A mixture of lengthy

par 3s and short par 4s create a shotmaker's paradise. Greens slope from back to front and include several plateau options to navigate.

The Valley course serves up several intriguing challenges, including blind shots to some greens and several downhill approach shots. Leave the driver in the bag when in doubt and avoid the railroad-tie-lined bunkers. One word of advice given from personal experience: Don't send any love to the heart-shaped bunkers on the back of the green on No. 17.

While every golf resort across Palm Springs offers outstanding dining, I made special provisions to sneak away to Rancho Mirage's epic Wally's Desert Turtle during my stay. Executive Chef Richard Pelz serves up a diverse menu that includes a spectacular poached lobster, pan-roasted pork tenderloin and seared duck breast. Desserts in the desert include macadamia nut bread pudding and Baked Alaska.

Thanks to Lake Bluff GC Head Professional/GM Ed Heiser, for getting the girls into the game at an excellent practice facility and golf course. Fifty-seven-year old Larry Mize, winner of the green jacket a couple years before Rickie Fowler's birth, made the cut while young lads Luke Donald, Phil Michelson, and Sergio Garcia were sent home packing. Following his eagle on No. 2 of the final round, 57-year-old Bernhard Langer—who won the Masters two years before Sang-Moon Bae's birth—was a few scant shots off the lead.

Stalking Bubba Watson throughout the tournament was 50-year-old Miguel Angel Jimenez, clearly the second most interesting man in the world.

And, as inevitable as taxes and overbilling lawyers, Fred "Boom Boom" Couples, age 54, maintained his name on the leaderboard throughout all four days of the tournament to eventually card his fifth top-20 Masters finish in a row.

Is 50 the new 30?

Chicago area golf fans seeking personal rejuvenation following a brutal winter should mark their calendars for June 16-22 to see the stars of the Champions Tour challenge the pristine grounds of North Shore C.C. at the Encompass Championship. Already committed to the tournament field as of early May was the aforementioned ageless wonder Langer along with other fellow Masters champions Mark O'Meara, Ben Crenshaw, Mize, Sandy Lyle, and 2013 Encompass champion Craig Stadler. Two Champions Tour luminaries whose schedules were still undetermined at press time were Jimenez and last year's Encompass Championship runner-up Couples.

Clearly the fan favorite at the 2013 Encompass Championship, Couples has fended off chronic back issues to excel in Champions Tour events. After finishing second in January's Mitsubishi Electric Championship in Hawaii, he won the Toshiba Classic at Newport Beach C.C. in California with a 15-under par. He followed that win with two top 10 finishes at the Mississippi Gulf Resort Classic and the Greater Gwinnett Championship. He also competed in the PGA Tour's Northern Trust Open at Riviera Country Club in California in February, missing the cut by a stroke. Entering May, he was in 2nd place in the Charles Swab Cup rankings and had an impressive 67.58 scoring average

While renowned for his laid-back persona, Couples displayed his competitive fire in the interview room following his victory in the season-ending Charles Schwab Cup Championship. "On this Tour," he said, "if

here and win. That's my goal." Entering this season, Couples laid out his game plan. "2014 is a big year," he said. "I'm going to practice; I'm going to be ready."

With a final round of 66 in last year's Encompass Championship also played at North Shore, Couples fell just one stroke was really a bad swing on as easy a shot as you'll ever have."

Couples waited until June 5th last year before committing to compete in the tournament. He juggled health concerns with his duties as captain of the 2013 Presidents' Cup team. The World Golf Hall of Fame member European and World points to earn a slot on the 2014 Ryder Cup team. Entering May, the Spaniard was 10th on the World Points list with 99.66, just slightly ahead of Stephen Gallacher. A total of 12 players represent each side of the prestigious Ryder Cup matches with nine Europeans earning their selection through point totals and the remaining three slots chosen by team captain Paul McGinley.

While Stadler and Couples put on an exciting show at the 2013 Encompass Championship, all entrants seemed to agree that the real star of the event was the historic North Shore C.C. layout in Glenview. Designed by the prestigious British firm of Colt & Alison with renovation work by local architect Rick Jacobson, the 7,031-yard course previously hosted the 1933 U.S. Open, the 1939 and 1983 U.S. Amateur Championships and the 2011 WGA Western Amateur Championship. Encompass Championship tournament director Mike Galeski stated that praise for the course during last year's tournament was universal. "The players raved about it for its classic style and its impeccable conditioning," he said in an April interview. "And the gallery loved it, as it's a fan-friendly property with outstanding sightlines on most every hole."

Galeski had previously worked as tournament director of the LPGA Tour's RJR Nabisco Championship and made a comparison between both tours. "The LPGA works very hard at being a fan-friendly tour," he said. "I see Champions Tour players embracing that same ethic. The Champions have come to really enjoy the pro-am experience. They are well aware that fans and sponsors are responsible for the tour's success."

The tournament director noted that Hall of Fame players like Crenshaw, Langer, and Couples help drive ticket sales. Galeski added, "The best players on the tour all want to come to Chicago. They know this is a huge market with great fans and an outstanding golf course. I guarantee that everyone who comes to North Shore will enjoy their experience."

Former European Tour and Ryder Cup star Montgomerie has already committed to playing at the Encompass Championship. Other notable field entrants are Steve Elkington, John Cook, Chicagoan Chip Beck, John Huston, Rocco Mediate, Jeff Sluman, and 1995 U.S. Open champion Corey Pavin.

In light of the Masters resurgence of so many Champions Tour players, it seems appropriate that the focus of this year's Encompass event will be young people. For 2014, the tournament has earmarked charitable contributions to four area youth-oriented organizations: The First Tee of Greater Chicago, Junior Achievement of Chicago, the Daniel Murphy Scholarship Fund, and JDRF (formerly the Junior Diabetes Research Foundation). Says Encompass Insurance president Tom Ealy: "In their own unique ways, each of these charities is focused on

improving the lives of young people and, by extension, the future of our community and our country."



It's how we started every morning, on every first tee, followed with a fist bump. I'm not sure why my dad decided to make that the mantra of our trip through the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail in Alabama, but it fit. After all, when two guys on two sets of surgically repaired knees set out to play eight golf courses and 153 holes over five days, it made sense to adopt a rally cry of sorts.

This bucket list trip with my pops requires a short backstory. My dad, also named Jim, tried to bring me into golf as a kid, but I'm an '80s baby from the south suburbs of Chicago. I grew up with Michael Jordan and Frank Thomas. What golf? I eventually got hooked on the game in my 20s and it's been a great way to bond with pops. Over the years, I've married, moved away, and we don't play as often. I miss it. So, I had been thinking about a father-son golf trip. But where to go? It had to be ... different. Epic. The "RTJ Trail" was it.

The Trail and its layout is built for just this sort of thing. It consists of 11 complexes (468 holes) in 13 cities stretching from the northern tip of Alabama to the Gulf Coast, all designed by Robert Trent Jones, Sr. himself or his design firm. The trail is easily navigated and it has a plethora of partner hotels on the route. If you build the time into your journey, then there are plenty of sights to see along the way. The courses are a wonderful mix, from short par-3 courses to tour-quality routings set uniquely in foothills, alongside lakes and rivers, and within swampland. The elevation changes make your heart race as you stand on a tee box, or pull a wedge to a false-fronted green a hundred yards away, but 30 yards above you. For two native Chicagoans, there was nothing like it.

March 9

Into Alabama, we got to know everyone's name —literally. Places like Rick's, Parker's, and Dot's welcome you. We arrived to a waterfall and aquarium at the Marriott Shoals in Florence in nine hours on the nose, along with the Tennessee River and the Wilson Dam beneath our window. We visited Swampers Bar, which chronicled the history of music in Muscle Shoals. After a long day on the road, it was a great way to end the night.

March 10

Golf began at the **Fighting Joe** in Muscle Shoals. With an unseasonably cool winter, the rough was still dormant, but the green fairways and putting surfaces provided a striking contrast. There aren't too many trees to worry about, but there is water on 13 of 18 holes. The wind is definitely a factor here. The 18th hole was a memorable par 3 that required an uphill tee shot at the clubhouse with the Tennessee River looming to the right.

Though it was our first round together since last summer, we found our chemistry on the third hole. I left my ball on the green, and dad putted down a ridge. It nicked my ball.

"That's two shots for not marking your ball," he said. "That's six shots for sucking."

We laughed.

Afterward, we left for Prattville and discovered that roller rinks remain popular and peaches are a fruit of choice. Churches and shuttered fullservice gas stations dotted the roadway. We pulled into the Prattville/Montgomery Marriott in time for dinner at the Oak Tavern, and the cozy room had a modern look. We were ready for four days of 36 holes!


March 11

The opening tee shot at **The Judge** at Capitol Hill, 200 feet above a fairway pinched by the Alabama River with a warm fog beneath us, was jaw dropping. Even the old man paused.

"Whoa."

The cart path restriction was tough, but the course was fair—though you had to think about shot placement and deceptive hazards. The greens were some of the best I've ever putted on. Water levels were low, but it was still unique, allowing us to see scores of turtles and the red clay of the swamp beds.

We then headed to **The Senator** and couldn't ask for a course that was a greater contrast to The Judge. No trees were in play and it allowed you to take on doglegs and the mounding with the potential for big





reward. The large greens required more precision and patience.

Following dinner, I learned the "to go" cup—a fresh refill of your coffee or sweet tea—is standard practice. Awesome.

March 12

The Cambrian Ridge in Greenville is set on the edge of the Appalachian chain. The elevation on the Sherling-Canyon combination was unforgettable. The natural funnels add dozens of yards require a precise approach.

We then headed to the Marriott Auburn/Opelika Hotel and Convention Center at Grand National. What a treat, as the two-room suite overlooked a pool, patio, tennis courts and Lake Saugahatchee. Weary joints welcomed the indoor hot tub and food and service from the Lake View restaurant, and the Fairways Lounge was top notch.

March 13

Grand National awaited us, beginning with the firm greens of The Lakes course, which were routed between mature trees and around the lake. The Links course was also a pleasant surprise in that it featured beautiful tree lines and spectacular bunkering, along with the challenge of more water and impressive elevation changes.

After golf, we headed to Hoover, and it was time for some hard questions from the golf writer.

Do you think it'd be better to play 18 a day and see the sights?

"That's fine, but we came to play golf."

How does this compare to your other golf

"For public courses, they're in good shape. Some of the ones in Myrtle Beach are kinda ratty."

There are some weird town names in this state, huh?

"Yeah. That one looks like it should be in Wisconsin."

We then arrived at the stunning Ross Bridges Renaissance; a castle against the night sky welcomed our tired bones. Our two-room suite included a kitchenette and living area that led out to a balcony overlooking the golf course and pool. The bedroom was large and modern, and it was definitely a great way to rest up for our final day of golf.

March 14

"Last day, Dad."

"Let's do this."

Ross Bridge was immaculate. Flowers bloomed, and it felt like sticking a tee in astroturf. The greens

Down Memory Lane

Losing a U.S. Open, But Wnning for **Scholars**

A turned right ankle may have cost Chick Evans a U.S. Open title. But it paid off in another way a generation later. Evans was one of the favorites for the U.S. Open title at Midlothian Country Club in 1914. That Open also marked the national debut of a talented assistant pro from Rochester, New York., a semi-pro baseball player who had postponed a tryout with the Philadelphia Phillies. His name was misspelled in some of the first stories about him and his first-round U.S. Open record 68.

"Hagin," they read. Everyone got 21-year-old Walter Hagen's name correct when he remained in contention. And it would be Evans and Hagen battling for the title when the final strokes of the Open were played on August 21. Chick had played himself into contention after an

opening 76. He'd scored 74 in the second round and 71 in the third. Hagen still led him by four, but Chick was charging while Tom McNamara and defending champion Francis Ouimet were fading.

But Evans might have run away from the field if not for a mishap on the eve of the Open. He was staying in a home owned by the Ellis family adjacent to the course, which then, aside from the mansions on the entrance drive. was located in the middle of farmland. "There was a very pretty girl named Dorothy Ellis," Evans remembered years later. "I asked her to run me a race out in front of the house in the rough at the 10th hole. We ran the race and I hit a hole and had a very badly sprained ankle. So I was eight shots back after 36 holes."

Evans and Hagen battled dramatically in the final round, the second round of the day. Contemporary

reports suggested the ankle bothered Evans while putting more than when he was driving or hitting crisp approach shots, but he was just a stroke back with nine holes to play. Hagen, afflicted by stomach flu before the Open, would come in with a back nine of 35. The final flourish, an eight-foot birdie after an errant drive that landed in front of the ninth green, was made up for by remarkable pitch. Evans' play was more erratic down the stretch. He'd threeputted the 12th green, but scrambled for pars on the 16th and 17th.

The only way for Evans to tie Hagen would be to eagle the par-4 18th, then 277 yards (and today the ninth hole). Chick hammered a drive that bounded onto the the front edge of the green. He had an uphill putt of from 30 to 45 feet, and ran it some eight inches left of the cup. Walter Hagen was the U.S. Open champion.

The Phillies never heard from him again. Instead, his dramatic style and personality lifted the profile of all professionals. Once consigned to the back of the clubhouse, they were allowed in the front door.

Meanwhile, low-amateur Evans had to be consoled by his many friends, including young Dorothy Ellis. She never forgot Chick and his run to within a stroke of the U.S. Open title outside her front door, and that became evident when she died in 1961.

"This pretty girl left \$65,000 to the Evans Scholars Foundation because she said I would have won the Open that year if I hadn't run her that race," Evans recalled.

The caddie scholarship concept hadn't been conceived when Hagen beat Evans. It began to emerge two years later, when Evans won the U.S. Open in Minneapolis and was confronted with endorsement offers. Only then did he realize that something beyond posing with a trophy could come of his success. The first scholars were admitted to Northwestern in 1930. By 1961, there were hundreds of caddie scholars in schools across the Midwest and beyond. Dorothy Ellis' gift was the largest in the program's history to that time.

were carpet. We had gotten used to the hills, but not the vistas: we'd stop and just take it all in. After that, we headed down the road to Oxmoor Valley and the Ridge Course.

As we waited on lunch, dad pointed to a framed picture. It was "The Duffer," a player leaning on his back leg, his front leg way out in the air.

"That's what you look like when you duff," I said.

Dad laughed.

We teed off, and it amazed us that even after a week of rolling hills, nothing repeated. I repeat, nothing repeated! Each hole was its own beast, with its own beauty. On the 18th, dad hit his final fairway of the week and I tapped in for par. We arrived back at Ross Bridge, exhausted, to the tune of the bagpiper signaling the end of daylight. We topped it all off in The Clubhouse with sweet tea and Alabama craft beer.

March 15

The odometer rested on 1,819.6 in Tinley Park. We took nearly that many shots (1,685) and dad's pedometer overheated with over 100,000 steps. The trip was full of laughter, a few curses and birdies, but all new memories for a father and a son together. Some of our favorites were the people, who were legitimately happy we were there, proud of the Trail and what it meant to the state.

But I had one last question. "Would you do this again?" "Oh veah."





Golf, Burgers, and The Inn at Benton Harbor

They are coming back, and so will you. On May 20th, The 75th Senior PGA Championship returns to Harbor Shores in Benton Harbor, Michigan. The event is round two, after the club hosted the 73rd Senior PGA Championship. The return of a major championship is an amazing backstory for a course that opened in 2010.

In the late 1970s, Benton Harbor's oncestable industrial roots crumbled and left few opportunities for area families who depended on manufacturing jobs. By the 1980s, decent jobs were scarce and the outlook was bleak. In 2000, a revitalizing effort was spearheaded by a non-profit initiative that awakened the community. A co-op of organizations, businesses, and the local government pumped a \$60 million investment into Benton Harbor. The 73rd Senior PGA Championship sparked a revitalized community and gained national attention for a city that was reborn. This year's championship promises to be a celebration of an idea that reinvented an entire community.

This spring, Harbor Shores, the golf club that spearheaded the initiative, has opened The Inn at Harbor Shores. With dramatic golf course views, The Inn completes the necessary amenities that were needed to make Harbor Shores a destination for golfers. With a marina and a four-star rating, The Inn offers ninety-two rooms, luxury suites, and executive-level penthouses with Lake Michigan views. Plank's Tavern on the Water, with river-front seating, is sure to keep foursomes satisfied with traditional American cuisine. The nine-story, upscale retreat also

has a roof-top deck which provides golf course views that are only exceeded by the stunning Lake Michigan backdrop. The Inn is serving golfers and keeping their heads in beds on the Benton Harbor side of the river.

The Jack Nicklaus signature course at Harbor Shores is a testament to the community's vision. What was once an industrial graveyard is now a major championship venue. The course's layout cannot be tied down to a classification of links or parkland. "You can't put a label on the style of this course. The first six hole stretch shows what Jack can do with a blank slate. The next three holes are in and out of the dunes," describes Ross Smith, General Manager at the club. "Holes 10 through 13 are like playing in Northern Michigan. And you finish with the final five holes along wetlands and the Paw Paw River." The eyelashes and rough'd bunker edges cannot be confused with the cookie cutter traps of 1990s golf design; this is a modern gem worthy of a major championship. This is a nationally-ranked course you can play.

While neighboring Point O' Woods is an iconic venue for championship golf and has hosted numerous Western Golf Association events, the private club requires an invitation. Harbor Shores, on the other hand, welcomes all players to challenge the course that humbled the legends of the PGA Tour. Tom Watson, during the 73rd Senior PGA Championship, shared his thoughts about Harbor Shores, "If you give it a 15 or 20 mile an hour wind, the fellows aren't going to be shooting it up very much. We'll be lucky to shoot par or better." The wind and dunes are always present, which surely pleases Tommy.



While Harbor Shores will lift your sails on each repeat round, the area has another public course that has been a Chicagoland favorite for years. Lake Michigan Hills Golf Course (www.lakemichiganhills.com) is just minutes north of Harbor Shores, and a couple of miles from the big lake. The Charles Maddox, Sr., design is a mature layout with dramatic vistas. The opening tee sets the tone for a difficult, yet thrilling, round of golf. The elevated tee box is hidden between bushes and presents the first hole through a picture framed by hardwoods. Perhaps my favorite hole at Lake Michigan Hills is the par 3, 17th hole. The uphill, 225-yarder is a stout test of your mettle and a par is a badge of honor if the wind is howling.

With plenty of beef from tee to green, the area's most popular eats are a stark contrast to the pristine golf clubs. North Shore Inn (107 Higman Park Road) is a dive, yet they grill burgers you will talk about as much as the golf shots you hit on the screws. During the last Senior PGA Championship, I sat across the North Shore's bar from Fred Couples, Brad Faxon, and Jeff Sluman. Each of the men two-fisting the gigantic burgers dripping with juice. Our waitress said it wasn't their first time in during tournament week. From the street, you may think the building is abandoned, and truthfully, the interior is not much better. However, North Shore, located just across the street from the back nine of the club, is as much a part of the Harbor Shores course as the Jack Nicklaus signature holes. Just like the golf course, you'll want to hit this tavern twice.

The 75th Senior PGA Championship will an affirmation that the Harbor Shores project was a success. This championship is the reward for a community that rolled the dice and is beating the odds. Now it is your turn to wander north and tackle a major venue...and maybe a major burger at the North Shore Inn.

Tiger, Meet My Sister...



eilly is as comfortable peeling the layers as he is crawling onto a limb and giving readers a bar-stool prediction. Accountable and astute, Reilly presents his take on sports with an engaging snarkyness that draws his readers into the inner circle of the sports world. *Tiger, Meet My Sister* isn't new material; however, each 'best of' selection affords readers an opportunity to reflect on controversial and significant events that dotted and tattered the lives of our favorite athletes and teams.

Perhaps one of the most revealing stories, "We Take Care of Our Own," details the hardships of one of Tiger Woods' siblings. The plight of Tiger's half-brother Kevin Woods will add fuel to the fire of Tiger-haters. In 2012, Kevin was entering the debilitating stages of multiple sclerosis and in need of a full-time caregiver, Tiger was less than sympathetic. As of press time of this book, the world's richest athlete was still MIA from Kevin's life.

On a lighter note, which is the theme of most of Tiger, Meet My Sister, Reilly pokes jabs at the smallness of Merion, for instance. This club houses amenities like a tiny player hospitality center and an inadequate remote backyard parking lot. Instead of complaining about such shortcomings, Reilly celebrates the similar quirks of our national championship venues.

For over three decades, Rick Reilly's scribbles have been a unique glimpse into the world of teams and athletes, and they remind of why we love sports writing like this.

f you're a fan of Greek food in the Chicago area, and the wines that go with them, youhave probably already sampled a few bottles from the ubiquitous house of Boutari, the world's number-one selling Greek wine.

The Boutari Company was established in 1879 by Yiannis Boutari in Naoussa on 124 acres, making it one of Greece's oldest purveyors of fine wine. With decades of experience and business acumen, it is one of the top wineries in Greece. Boutari wines are exported to over 45 countries and have won over 370 medals in international wine competitions.

Boutari was the first and only Greek winery to ever win the award "European Winery of the Year" from Wine Enthusiast, after evaluating its performance in winemaking over time.

Although a producer with a long tradition, Boutari isn't bound by it. They have embraced modern international winemaking techniques, such as the use of stainless steel, cold-temperature fermentation, and French-oak barrel aging. They strive to get the most from both indigenous Greek and French grape varieties.

The extensive Boutari holdings are comprised of six wineries in Greece: Naoussa, Santorini, Peloponissos, Crete, Goumenissa, and Attica, and one winery in Southern France, near the city of Limoux. Each winery has its own distinct personality, influenced by the architecture and the atmosphere of the particular region within which it is located.

2012 Santorini Assyrtiko The island of Santorini, located in Greece's

Aegean Sea, is a defunct volcanic caldera, and home to some of the oldest vineyards in Greece (at upwards of 300 years).

First comes this wine's quite pale yellow color in the glass. Next up is a relatively closed nose, with delicate hints of ripe melon. But then things get interesting, with flavors of mango, apple, and grapefruit. There's a crisp, racy acidity with a suggestion of lemon zest.

This island-born wine practically demands to be paired with seafood, such as Porgies with Avgolemono Sauce, Squid in Wine, or Baked Lobster Tails with Feta, but something like Chicken Breasts in Phylo would be delicious as well.

2009 Naoussa This wine hails from Bourtari's original winery


in Naoussa, on the southeastern foothills of Mount Vermio in the northern Macedonia region, about thirty miles northwest of the Aegean Sea. The soils are calcium-rich marl (clay loam), and dampened by abundant rainfall.

Made from 100% Xinomavro, the premier red-wine grape of Greece, Naoussa is all about dry, tart, dark cherry, which dominates in the color; on the nose, which also includes the aromas derived from ageing, cinnamon, and wood; and on the palate. Support comes from a nice acidity and soft, medium-grained tannins. To get the most from this bottle, let it breathe for about 30 minutes, and don't serve it too warm (i.e. above 65° F).

Enjoy a glass (or two) of Naoussa with a classic Souvlakia, Pork with Green Olives, or Moussaka with Artichokes (which will be abundant right about now).

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Majors Migrating North

FROM THE **FRINGE** Insights on the **PGA Tour**

The sun has risen in the North, and Wisconsin is basking in the glow of its Golden Age of professional golf.

The Chicago area? It has been left holding the bag after the greatest Ryder Cup collapse in American team history in the fall of 2012 at Medinah Country Club. From 1999 through 2012, the state hosted two PGA Championships (1999, 2006 at Medinah), one U.S. Open (2003, Olympia Fields), one U.S. Women's Open (2000, The Merit Club), one Solheim Cup (2009, Rich Harvest Farms) and the 2012 Ryder Cup. That's a great slate, with some great champions and memorable moments. It was a great run, Illinois. However, the PGA Tour, and its majors, will see more action above the cheddar curtain than around Sweet Home Chicago.

"The city of Chicago is a great golf town," said 2013 PGA Champion Jason Dufner, who was part of the U.S. Ryder Cup team at Medinah. "It has a lot of history with the game of golf." Somewhere along the line however, the eyes of the PGA of America and the United States Golf Association began to wander. We can speculate as to why, and how. It matters not, really, because they did—and Chicagoland has been left in the dust.

True, Wisconsin does not have its own annual PGA Tour stop either, and the North Shore is home to the Champions Tour's Encompass Championship and, on a part-time basis, the BMW Championship. However, Wisconsin has become major golf's favorite Midwestern destination. Illinois won't have a monopoly on tour events much longer either, as there is buzz circulating the state that when PGA Tour pro's Steve Stricker and Jerry Kelly turn 50 in 2017, their home of Madison, Wisconsin. will immediately become a spot for a Champions Tour event as well. While everyone, myself included, would love to see either the PGA or LPGA tours return to the Chicago area on a full-time basis, it's always all about the majors.

And Wisconsin's got a stranglehold on that.

From 2010 through 2020, our neighbors to the north will have two PGA Championships (2010, 2015 at Whistling Straits), one U.S. Open (2017, Erin Hills), one U.S. Women's Open (2012, Blackwolf Run), and one Ryder Cup (2020, Whistling Straits). Toss in the 2004 PGA Championship and the 2007 U.S. Senior Open, and Wisconsin has held, or will hold, seven major championships or team competitions of that ilk since the turn of the century. The key phrase there is "will hold."

Dufner's right, the history of major golf in the Chicago area is remarkable. But that's the problem. While the history is lengthening, the future is stagnating. The Chicago area has had five majors or major

team competitions since 2000, but no more are currently booked outside of the 2016 LGPA International Crown at Rich Harvest. To add insult to injury, Donald Trump just added his first two men's majors to his 2017 U.S. Women's Open—the 2017 PGA Championship and the 2022 PGA Championship. Donald. Trump. C'mon, man.

Venues aren't the problem here, of course. "Medinah holds its own, I think, when you speak of it as a major championship venue," Dufner said. "It'll be interesting to see when they get back to Chicago for some major championship golf." Indeed. You figure Medinah might be a pick for the 2021 PGA Championship, but man, that's a long drought. If that educated guess holds up, that would mean no four-round, stroke play major championship had been played in the state for 15 years. Wisconsin? How about six between 2004 and 2017.

So, this year, we'll just have to make sure to support the Encompass Championship at North Shore Country Club (June 16-22) and head west to attend the John Deere Classic out in Silvis (July 7-13). It's a year where the BMW Championship rotates out, this time to Denver. And it's a year where the Ryder Cup will be held in Europe, at The PGA Centenary Course in Gleneagles, Scotland. We'll see the rousing highlights of 2012 at Medinah, then. And like Jim Furyk, Steve Stricker, Phil Mickelson, Dufner and the like—we'll remember it as an incredible experience with great fan support, but we'll also be acknowledging that it's past. Hopefully the powers that be in the golf world start working on a brighter future when it comes to major championship golf in Chicago. With our fingers crossed, we can only hope one of the nation's authentic golf meccas plays host to the world's best before your grandkids are born.

Encompass Pointing Up

The newest tour stop in Illinois couldn't have gotten off to a better start last year, as Craig Stadler held off Fred Couples, Kenny Perry, Mark O'Meara, and Tom Pernice, Jr. to capture the inaugural Encompass Championship. Tournament organizers had to be thrilled to see likely participants like Bernhard Langer and Couples play well at the Masters in April and those two are atop the Charles Schwab Cup standings. What's also nice to see is that guys with Illinois ties like Jay Haas and former PGA Champion Jeff Sluman are playing well also.

I know the idea of appearance fees makes people bristle (especially when tour pro's skip events stateside to go overseas), but I think Champions Tour events should have that option. How big of a deal would it be if Greg Norman, Vijay Singh, and Miguel Angel "The Mechanic" Jimenez teed it up at North Shore?

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
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
