

The crocus may or may not have bloomed in your backyard, but spring is here. That mountain of snow has melted. The sun is higher in the sky. Thunder occasionally rumbles. You may have even hit the links on a reasonably warm – above 45 degrees – day.

The key indicator is on the television screen. Golf's on the telly 24/7, but for those of a certain age, the annual transmissions from Augusta, Georgia – off the television map for the other 51 weeks of the year – mean earth still follows a proper orbit and warmer days are ahead.

Amen (corner) to that.

The Masters is the one tournament that we can't get enough of, and perhaps the limited hours on the air – even the five hours on Sunday seem to go by in

seconds – is why. Few will watch all of the U.S. Open across four days, or even a regular tournament on the circuit, which might cover 12 or 14 hours, but the Masters? We're glued to the set, and often have the iPad with one of the extra channels that Augusta offers. Who can resist watching action at Amen Corner all day? It's a magical place, Augusta National. It changes every year, sometimes subtly, occasionally outrageously, as when Hootie Johnson turned into Johnny

Appleseed and planted pine trees everywhere but downtown Aiken to toughen the course. But the place is always green, manicured more perfectly than a Hollywood star, and always ready for its close-up.

It's also a different place. Fans can't bring in cell phones, so there's no chance of a buzz, unless you hit the concession stands with the 1980s prices for the \$4 beers. There's also no official course rating for the layout, and the green jackets never announce Stimpmeter speeds for the roly-poly greens. (Upon the switch from bermuda to bent a generation ago, they ran 18, which is equivalent to infinity, a member whispered to someone sworn to secrecy.)

Augusta National is treated with more reverence than it should be – did you know it's a for-profit company following a bankruptcy way back? – but it's earned a special place in golf.

Even when the azaleas bloom early.

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THE GOOD STUFF



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This is for the golfer who has everything: A golf towel with a magnetic corner that will, as magnets are wont to do, stick to clubs, metal clubheads, golf cart posts, and so on. Monument Golf calls the removable patch "industrial strength," but the idea is attractive. You can't lose your golf towel if you have it stuck to your clubs or your cart. It comes with a white or grey towel.

A Ping With More Zing

Game-improvement is a manufacturer's phrase for clubs for medium-and-up handicappers. Ping calls the G700 iron series game-improvement, but the clubs have the look of a club a Tour player could wield. The hollow-bodied clubs move weight from the clubface to make for more loft and easier shotmaking. The standard set begins with the 4-iron and runs through the sand wedge at 54 degrees, with the lofts for the "power spec" set 1.5 to 2 degrees less.

Go Rogue

No, not politically. On the tee, Callaway is getting a lot of mileage out of its Rogue driver and fairway metals, and with good reason. They employ 2017's new development from the Epic driver, Jailbreak technology, which dampens the natural twist of the clubhead by the use of titanium bars behind the clubface to prevent it from deflecting. In the Rogue, the bars are lighter but as effective. The clubface itself is of variable thickness, and the driver is 460 cc, larger than the Epic. All this wizardry, plus options for a draw-friendly driver and the Sub Zero, with adjustable weights to lower spin rate in both the driver and fairway woods, has made the clubs popular on the pro tours.

Sweet Home Chicago

\$60 Million and Counting

Urban renewal does not come cheap.

Nor do high-end golf courses.

Put the two together, and even a rich man might consider taking out a loan or begging for donations.

That, on a municipal level, is the case with the proposed rebuilding of the Jackson Park and South Shore golf courses on Chicago's lakefront. A controversial concept when it was announced last year, the project is now in its second iteration, and the announced \$30 million price tag of 2017 has doubled.

So said Chicago Park District general superintendent Mike Kelly when the revised routing was revealed to the public this winter. He was upfront in noting that much of the money for the course had to be raised, and that much of the rest – including \$25 million for a pair of critical underpasses that would connect portions of the course – had not been allocated to the project in any budget.

There is every likelihood, of course, that the \$60 million cost will go up. Environmental issues, notably the relocation of a nature sanctuary, are still in question. So is the construction timetable. Kelly noted that once construction began, it would be at least 18 months.

The project is already a year behind the envisioned schedule, and Jackson Park and South Shore remain open in their original configurations as separate 18- and 9-hole park district courses.

"We did slow down and we have a better project for it," Kelly said.

The golf course design, by Beau Welling of Tiger Woods' design company, was changed considerably from the original concept. It now features a clubhouse on the south end of the course. The front nine returns to the new clubhouse so nine-hole rounds could be accommodated. South Shore's gigantic old clubhouse, now called the Cultural Center, remains.

The par-70 course, a better layout than Welling's original, plays anywhere from 2,998 to 7,161 yards for customers, and with the use of wayback tees, including one that would play over a public beach on the 16th hole, 7,341 yards for a tournament, should one be held

there. (The beach would be closed if the BMW Championship or a similar tournament played through.)

One thing that could push the project to happening – and some industry insiders think it's a 50-50 proposition at this point – is its inclusion in the South Lakefront Framework Plan. The Obama Presidential Center, planned for a part of Jackson Park immediately north of the golf course, is also in that plan.

"This is part of the Framework Plan, and the Framework Plan will not be published until we've got a consensus on golf," Kelly said. "I need the community's support and I need the donors' support. It is our intention that this will be a privately fund-raised golf course and that it will be something supported by the community and the donors."

Kelly argued that the two existing courses were outdated, saying Jackson Park had narrower fairways than Oakmont Country Club – which is hundreds of yards longer and effectively widened its fairways only after taking down every tree – and that South Shore had smaller greens than Pebble Beach. As it should, since it's a course with short par 3s, unlike Pebble, where only the par-3 seventh is of a similar length.

While the city and park district plan on trading some land to make room for the Obama Center – which will eliminate Cornell Drive as a shortcut from Stony Island Avenue to Lake Shore Drive – the Framework Plan is expected to be debated and tweaked for several months.

Remembering Brent Wadsworth

In golf, the name Wadsworth conjures up visions of earth movers and tractors, clearing or creating a landscape for a new course.

But Brent Wadsworth, who died February 6 at his Yorkville home at 88, was more than a man who liked to get his hands dirty as a worker in the field whose course construction company came to be recognized as the best in the country.

He was a philanthropist, both privately and through the Wadsworth Golf Charities Foundation, which was founded in 1997, 40 years after his first

Down Memory Lane

The First World Championship'

George S. May was never bashful.

Thus, when in 1943 the flamboyant impresario of Tam O'Shanter decided golf needed a boost and arranged a 36-hole match between Harold "Jug" McSpaden and Sam Byrd, winners of the All-American Open at Tam and the Chicago Victory National at Beverly, respectively, he didn't call it an exhibition.

He called it the first World Championship.

The winner – which turned out to be McSpaden – collected \$1,000, double what runner-up Byrd earned – but more important, May was pleased that 2,500 fans came out on an October weekend 75 years ago, spurning college and pro football turnstiles to watch his concoction.

The All-American was already popular. Now he

saw a second opportunity to bring in fans. After World War II ended, he took advantage. In the 1946 World Championship there were four players, then eight and 12 in subsequent years. And in 1949, May expanded to a 72-hole full-field showcase featuring men's and women's pro and amateur divisions with network TV coverage on DuMont. Crowds flocked to Tam to see pros play for ever-increasing purses.

It was the 1953 edition, the first on coast-to-coast TV, that proved May's gamble correct.

Lew Worsham

sank a skidding 104-yard wedge shot on the final hole for an eagle 2 to beat Chandler Harper by a stroke. First-time viewers thought golf was a snap, Worsham collected \$25,000, Harper pocketed \$10,000 and May crowed. The next year, the first prize of \$50,000, captured by Bob Toski, was more than anyone won across the rest of the season.

McSpaden's \$1,000 in 1943 was laughably small by today's standards, but the raging war and travel restrictions meant there were only three regular tournaments all year. Combined with his \$2,000 for winning the All-American, he was the Tour's leading money winner with only \$3,000 – which is why the PGA Tour to this day omits the number, saying "statistics not compiled."

construction job. The last few years, it has donated upwards of a half-million dollars to various golf organizations across the country, ranging from junior golf operations in New Jersey, Tennessee and Nebraska to park districts with burgeoning junior programs, such as Rockford's.

The foundation's main goal is building – with the parent for-profit company doing the construction – youth-friendly golf courses, layouts of three, six or nine holes, and often convertible via multiple tees, where kids could both learn how to play the game and be comfortable on the course.

"Links Across America," it's called, and one of the first courses was the four-hole layout and practice area on Lockport Township High School's east campus. If there's another high school with even one real golf hole on its property, we don't know about it. But that innovative thinking is what Wadsworth and his late friend, golf pro Leon McNair, believed would bring new golfers to the game.

Wadsworth started as an architect with designer Larry Packard, then saw construction as a field with

a future and went all-in on that end. His design and construction of Fox Bend, which opened in 1967, was his lone solo design project in the Chicago area. Naturally, when Fox Bend's layout was tweaked a few years ago, Wadsworth was the constructor of choice.

The company handles large and small projects, and built a reputation of solid work on short notice. The best example came when downpours and a flood turned Rae's Creek into a torrent and obliterated Augusta National's 11th and 12th greens one winter. With the Masters a few months away, the club called Wadsworth. Armed with plans detailing the contours to millimeters and an unlimited budget, the firm rebuilt the holes perfectly.

Wadsworth also built Shadow Creek, the Las Vegas wonderland course, and local layouts ranging from Cantigny to the recent reconstruction of the Preserve at Oak Meadows.



The \$35 Volunteer Package includes a tournament logo golf shirt, a tournament logo golf cap or visor, a tournament credential with lanyard, a meal for each shift worked, six "any day" tickets, and, best of all, a discounted round of golf at private Ivanhoe Club (three shifts minimum, and a cart fee applies).

Shag Bag

The Blackberry Amateur has begun taking entries for this year's tournament, June 23-24 at Blackberry Oaks in Bristol. Players with 8.0 or lower handicaps can register at blackberryamateur.com; fee is \$140. ... The Niles Park District is applying a \$1.3 million makeover to its Tam O'Shanter nine-hole course for a late spring

reopening. Greens and bunkers are being reshaped and tees updated, with drainage improved to allow the course to reopen more quickly after downpours. Bob Lohmann's firm did the planning, while Wadsworth is carrying it out. ... In contrast, Lake Bluff's park district is considering closing its golf course as it reaches its 50th anniversary, citing financial losses and a need to spend money on clubhouse upgrades if the course remains open. Some 200 people were at a late-February meeting and most wanted the course kept open. The course, which opened in 1968, is mostly on a flood plain. ... Kyle Holmes is the new manager of Harbor Shores GC in Benton Harbor, Mich., which hosts the Senior PGA Championship again this year over Memorial Day weekend.



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
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Tackling The Downhill Wedge

Downhill wedge shots are difficult, and it doesn't take much of a downhill slope to create a problem. Changing your orientation to the ground by tilting your shoulders is the best solution to hitting downhill shots, as long as the slope isn't too severe.

The solution to a downhill lie: The proper set-up for downhill slopes is to spread your stance (feet) more than normal to provide a wider base, then lean forward to get your spine closer to perpendicular to the sloping ground. This will also place a disproportionate and unusual loading on your forward leg, knee and ankle, and make keeping your balance as you swing a real challenge.

Because this forward weight distribution is unusual doesn't mean it's wrong. In

fact, for downhill trouble lies, it's the exact position you need to maintain through impact in order to execute a successful, powerful escape from this lie.

Set your shoulders parallel to the ground, keep your balance as well as you can on your backswing, then make a good through-swing. Allow yourself to walk forward on your follow-through to keep from falling. You can play the ball in the middle (or slightly back in your stance if you want to provide a little "fudge margin," to avoid hitting the shot fat), and plan on the ball coming out low and running longer than normal once on the ground.

When the slope is severe: When the downslope gets too steep to stand with your shoulders parallel to the ground,

make a walk-through finish. Stand vertically, but set up aiming way left. Open your clubface and hit a cut shot from the sidehill lie you've created (see the setup in the Golfer's Eye View photo). Aiming far left changes the downhill lie to a sidehill lie, with the ball below your feet. This is still not an easy shot, but if you can't catch the heel of your wedge on the ground before impact, you can hit a cut slice around your target.

Practicing this in the mirror is a great way to internalize the adjustments and the feel of swinging from the proper position. Now you're getting the feel of putting your body into position (wide stance and minimum spine tilt or lean) to make good solid escape swings from sloping lies. Good scoring to you!




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

Junior Golf is the Sport's Growth Engine

Flipping the dial on the old TV, sans a remote control back then, is how I discovered the game of golf as a 14-year-old kid on the far northeast side of Chicago in the Rogers Park community. From there I spoke with my parents who had a couple of friends that were avid players, so perhaps they could guide me and show me the finer points of the game.

One of those friends took me out to Evanston Community Golf Course (now it's Canal Shores) and we just went out on the quiet course late in the day where I was taught some of the basics and proceeded to hit a couple of ground balls, pretty straight if I remember correctly. So I was hooked.

From there I started getting golf magazines and instructional books in order to hone my game. Moving onward in my progression was a PE golf class in high school. That consisted of "some instruction" from the teacher and hitting whiffle golf balls off of an AstroTurf mat into the wall of the gym, or just clanging around off the old wooden bleachers. Of course there was no video, so the only real way to see your swing was to look into a mirror! What am I getting at with all this hyperbole is that learning and playing golf as youngster has come a long way in the past forty-plus years.

Now in Chicago, you have a number of top-notch

organizations, including the Illinois Junior Golf Association, The First Tee of Greater Chicago, the American Junior Golf Association, and the team-based PGA Junior League. Plus, nearly every golf course around town has junior group lessons, or a junior program of some sort for boys and girls.


One of the finest programs to look into is The First Tee of Greater Chicago. They facilitate programs at 24 golf course locations throughout the Chicago Metropolitan area. Sessions begin in April and run through October. A key component of the First Tee is offering group lessons for youth ages 7-17, regardless of background and experience.

"Golf is a sport for a lifetime, so having fun and learning the basic fundamentals at an early age will not only prepare them for success on and off the golf course, it will increase the likeliness of them becoming a golfer for life," executive director Lisa Quinn said.

The off-the-course equation is a First Tee key. It focuses on nine principles – core values, the group calls them – to be followed on and off the course, backed by nine healthy habits. In many ways, golf is used as the hook to get children to be better people. And given the pleasant learning environment, they may stay in the game as adults.

Another great place to start getting your children involved

is the Illinois Junior Golf Association. The IJGA is dedicated to providing playing opportunities for its members ages 8-18, conducting educational clinics and events, and serving as a junior golf information clearinghouse. Each year the IJGA provides and manages over 140 separate events throughout Illinois. These include one-day 9-hole and 18-hole tournaments, and 36-hole and 54-hole major championships.

Jordan Abdel-Haq, the IJGA's executive director, knows it's key to start kids off early in our sport.

"While there are certainly very competitive juniors and events at this level, the Youth Development Program is geared more for development and as such, is less competitive as a whole than our older divisions," Abdel-Haq said. "We believe it is like anything else. The earlier you start, the more reps you are afforded and the comfort level with the pressure of tournament golf (which is much different than a recreational round) is greater as the juniors begin to enter the more competitive events.

"From a social standpoint, it also takes some time for juniors to get comfortable with their peers/fellow competitors and that can sometimes be easier when starting young because everyone else is probably fairly similar in terms of their years of experience in the IJGA."

Golf is the perfect sport for your kid, and the ideal babysitter. The recipe is plain to see – fresh air, exercise, learning the game, meeting new people and making new friends. It's the safest sport there is, keeps the kids out of trouble, off the streets and onto the lush green fairway.

"The First Tee is more than a sports program for youth," Quinn adds. "Its coaches create positive relationships that

inspire young people to discover their individual potential. Plus, golf is unique from other sports because players learn values like honesty and responsibility by calling penalties on themselves and reporting their own score. The sport is the perfect platform for helping kids develop character because just like in life, players experience the highs and lows of the game."

Abdel-Haq believes the values of golf are a terrific platform for kids of all ages.

"Parents should consider entering their kids into the game of golf (not just the IJGA) because of all the qualities and skills that the game teaches a young person," Abdel-Haq said. "Furthermore, the IJGA gives juniors the chance to compete and see how they stack up against their peers. But just as important, it provides an outlet for social interaction and exercise, in what we feel is one of the safest sports available for young juniors.

"Regardless of the level of competition that the junior attains, the ability to play the game of golf can be beneficial beyond junior golf and if nothing else, is an activity that can be enjoyed throughout the entire life span."

The PGA Jr. League, to use the organization's preferred spelling, is another terrific group to look into. The Chicago area currently has more than 20 courses offering open enrollment – families don't have to have an existing relationship with the golf course in order for their kids to participate. Parents can visit www.PGAJrLeague.com and enter their zip code to find nearby courses and register online. This list of courses is expected to grow.

from PGA and LPGA Professionals. Some facilities offer 16 and under programs. Kids play in a supportive, two-person scramble format that encourages mentorship, builds confidence and promotes sportsmanship. They also wear team jerseys with numbers. Cog Hill's team has advanced to the national championship the last two years.

Early in March, the Illinois PGA announced an alliance with Junior.Golf, an Austin, Tex.-based marketing company, to use their computer platform to make it easier for players – parents and kids alike, to find and sign up for everything from lessons to leagues.

“With the increased influence of technology in the sport, we are committed to supporting Illinois PGA members with tools that give them a competitive advantage to grow their business and increase the number of golfers playing in Illinois,” Illinois PGA executive director Carrie Williams said.

Kids can also learn by watching, so here's another heads up. Harbor Shores Golf Club in Benton Harbor, Mich., will be hosting the Senior PGA Championship from May 22-27. All juniors age 17 and under receive free access with a ticket adult. Bring the entire family to see these living legends up close and personal; visit www.SrPGA.com for more info.

Junior golf opportunities have grown by leaps and bounds since the 1970s. I wouldn't change the way I learned the game, but perhaps if I learned the game through one of these groups I might have been a little better. Instead of always tweaking, it would have been great to learn the game properly with correct fundamentals at an early age.

Yes, opportunities for junior golfers are plentiful to say the least!


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New Look for Royal Fox

In an era when other area country clubs are struggling to survive, Royal Fox Country Club in St. Charles is nearing the completion of a regal renaissance. Opened in 1990, the private club underwent an evaluation by membership, staff and the new ownership group early last year with the singular goal of upgrading every aspect of the facility, from the golf course to the clubhouse to the food service to the club's other amenities.

The resulting action plan was specific: Spare no expense to make Royal Fox the premier country club and residential community in the western suburbs and the only dual private club membership opportunity with privileges at their sister club in Long Grove, The Grove Country Club (formerly Hillcrest Country Club).

"Royal Fox is a unique club in many ways," explained club general manager and PGA Professional Brian Tulk during a late February sneak preview of interior clubhouse renovation. "Much of our membership lives either on the club grounds or nearby. Thus, the club is virtually an extension of their homes. They can utilize the picturesque surrounding areas for evening walks and many use our fitness center in the mornings. Whether the members are meeting other members and their families to watch a ballgame in the evening or stop in for the happy hour after work, we want the experience to be special."

That said, the new ownership group which bought the club last year felt it was time to reward long-time members and to make the complex an extra-special experience for guests and new members.

"The first order of business when I started in April of 2017 was to organize a business plan to make top-down changes and improvements, which included the acquisition of a brand new equipment fleet to provide our superintendent the resources needed to improve the daily turf maintenance operations," said Tulk. "Mike Siefken, the golf course superintendent, has made it a top priority to deliver tournament conditions every day."

The centerpiece of the club is a championship golf course designed by local legend Dick Nugent, whose credentials include the public Harborside International in Chicago and the private Dunes Club in New Buffalo, Mich., ranked by many experts as the finest 9-hole course in America. Nugent, who died New Year's Day at age 86, utilized the property's naturally rolling terrain to construct a 6,816-yard, par-71 gem that over the years has hosted seven Illinois Opens and multiple CDGA qualifying events.

If Charles Dickens would have written about the course, he surely would have called his work "A Tale of Two Courses," as the tree-lined and bunker-filled front nine gives way to a water hazard-laced back nine. The stars of the front nine are two delightful par 3s. The 200-yard fifth hole calls for a hybrid or fairway wood to a massive tiered green surrounded by six bunkers. The putting surface on No. 8 is more open with only three bunkers fronting this formidable 220-yard challenge. A par on either hole feels like a birdie.

If time constraints keep you from playing the final four holes known as The Bear Trap on the PGA National's Champion course,



you can face a startlingly similar sequence of finishing holes at Royal Fox. The 378-yard 15th plays much longer due to water along the entire left side of the fairway and deviously-positioned fairway bunkers to the left and right of the landing area. The 427-yard 16th calls for a tee shot avoiding water down the left side of the fairway and a creek crossing the landing area 240 yards from the tee. No. 17, a manly par 3, demands a formidable tee shot over a large pond to a large tiered green also protected by an L-shaped bunker on the back side.

Finally, the 550-yard 18th is a true three-shot par 5, as the tee shot must be kept away from a large pond that rests along the

left side of the fairway 80 yards up to the green. From there, the putting surface is surrounded by both more water and three snaking bunkers, the green complex atop a bulkhead-fronted bluff. If no one has ever referenced this as Nugent's Revenge, I just did.

While the design of much of the course remains intact, irrigation and drainage upgrades have been vastly improved to ensure that the layout quickly recovers from drenching storms. Phase One of the course project involves bunker renovations, cart path pavement and replacement of the invasive grasses around the fairways and greens in the transitional areas where multiple

Upon reflection, it's safe to say that Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones got it all wrong. Time, truly, is not on his side. Nor, more importantly, is it on the side of most golfers. While we may never identify the masochist who invented golf so many centuries ago, it is safe to say he had far more time available back then than we ever will. Who among us – besides perhaps our Golfer-in-Chief – can regularly budget the four or five or six hours it takes to play a round of golf?

Golf course managers across the nation have, of course, spent many sleepless nights pondering this question. Some have created speed-of-play programs aimed at getting players through rounds in under 4.5 hours. Others have rigged their courses up in various loops of 12 holes and four holes to accommodate busy schedules. Still others have just split courses into separate nines to promote nine-hole rounds.

It's easy to find a nine-hole course, or a 18-hole (or more) facility that will sell a nine-hole round. But what about after the final putt drops? This is where GOLFChicago comes in. Fortunately for time-sensitive area players, the metro area is home to over a

dozen terrific stand-alone nine-hole courses along with larger golf facilities which offer more than 18 holes.

Herewith, a gazetteer to some of the better courses and bistros, some at the course and some nearby, where time-strapped players needing hydration and food following their rounds can both raise a glass and chow down. It is by no means complete, so consider it an appetizer to what can be found in our area.

Cantigny Golf, Wheaton

We start in the western suburbs, where Cantigny Golf has embraced nine-hole golf in a big way. The 27-hole complex in Wheaton is promoting a "Couples Nine and Dine" event on Saturday, June 16 that includes nine-hole green fees, range balls, prizes for net and gross winners, an obstacle course putting contest and a BBQ dinner with head pro Patrick Lynch. They set a fine table at Cantigny. The two-person scramble event will be repeated on July 21 and, assuming its success, summers and years into the future.

Sydney R. Marovitz Golf Course, Chicago

This popular nine-hole gem rests east of Lake Shore Drive on the city's north side and features terrific views of both the city and Lake Michigan. Built as a nine-hole addition to the original (and now long-gone) nine holes at Diversey Ave. in Lincoln Park, the 3,265-yard course was among two in Chicagoland ranked among the 25 best nine-hole courses in America by *Golf World* in 2010.

As the golf course is just a few blocks away from Wrigley Field, there are more dining and pub options here than any other place in the city. The Cubby Bear Lounge (where you might find a band playing after twilight golf) at Clark and Addison and Murphy's Bleachers at Waveland and Sheffield are fan favorites with a Cub-centric atmosphere, while fine dining options include Mia Francesca (3111 N. Clark St.), Diva Thai & Sushi Bar (3542 N. Halsted St.), and the newly constructed Budweiser Brickhouse Tavern (3647 N. Clark St.) immediately northwest of the ballpark.

Downers Grove Golf Club, Downers Grove

No guide to nine-hole courses in metro Chicago can exclude this remarkable layout. Celebrated as the site of Charles Blair Macdonald's first design, the original Chicago Golf Club was built on farmland in Belmont (which later became Downers Grove) and was so successful it compelled club members to purchase an additional plot of land in nearby Wheaton. After the club changed addresses in 1895, the Downers Grove property was operated by the Illinois Golf Club for a year, briefly farmland again, and evolved into the Belmont Golf Club in 1899 on some of the same property Macdonald used, plus an adjacent plot of land.

It is that course that transitioned 69 years later when the city park district purchased it. Downers Grove says only five holes remain from that design, largely that of Herbert James Tweedie, after renovations were made over the years to accommodate a driving range.

Built on a surprisingly hilly landscape, the course winds through trees that were surely not part of Macdonald's original



Nine, Dine and Wine

Area golf courses serve up couples nine and dine specials

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Stable Strength = Faster Swing

With golf season fast approaching the Chicago area, it is very important to prepare your body for a stable golf swing that can produce more speed without risking injury. Working and teaching at one of the premier health clubs in the country has taught me that just because a person might become stronger, it does not make them faster or more efficient with their golf swing. In order to produce longer drives and more consistent contact with your irons, you need stability to support increased speed. Core, ankle, thigh, glute and shoulder stability are essential to make your 2018 golf season a success.

That strength doesn't come overnight, but here are two exercises demonstrated by myself and Matt Bailey.

In the first exercise you can use a fitness band to engage core and shoulder stability. If you do not have one, a golf club will suffice.

(Photo 1) Start position is with your front foot planted flat in line with the front knee. The rear foot is placed behind with the toes down, heel up. This is a balance and stability position. Stretch out the resistance band to engage the core and shoulders.

(Photo 2) Second position is to turn away like you would do in a golf swing. Maintain your balance and hold for three seconds.

(Photo 3) Third position is rotating as fast as you can in the other direction while maintaining balance. You should feel ankle, thigh, glute, core and shoulder stability. Hold the finish move for three seconds.

Repeat the move five times and reverse the feet and swing direction in order to work both sides.





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varieties had taken root. Phase Two will incorporate grass bunkers and waste bunkers into the final design.

Even long-time residents and guests of the club will be staggered by the massive renovations performed across the interior of the clubhouse. "Our 30,000-square foot clubhouse is the epicenter of Royal Fox," said Tulk. "We studied every aspect of the building, from the patio to the veranda to the dining areas to the banquet facilities to the swimming pools and to the lounge. We saw different ways we could improve each area from a service and logistical approach and also to enhance the member experience."

"The upstairs Saloon is definitely the member's focal point of the clubhouse main level, providing expansive views of the golf course and a birds-eye view of the 18th green. We wanted to build on what works and modernize other areas that need updating," said Tulk.

Last year, the clubhouse roof was entirely replaced. Additional enhancement projects since include upgraded lighting, renovated restrooms, restaurant equipment, furniture upgrades, paint, tile and carpet are either already in process or planned for this spring. "Our private party and banquet business is thriving at both clubs and we've added a new director of sales to continue to grow," said Tulk. Several upgrades are also planned for The Grove this year and next.

"Our improvements haven't stopped with the golf course and clubhouse," said Tulk. "We have also recruited top talent to manage our golf courses and dining operations, starting with the addition of our new Executive Chef, Michael Lannon, who previously spent seven years as the Executive Chef at Naperville Country Club."

In April, Alex Mendez will become head professional at Royal Fox after a

long stint at Butterfield Country Club. He takes over from Chris Ettner, who moved to The Grove Country Club. Ettner will work alongside the club's new Director of Golf, Fred Reeder, who spent 20 years at the prestigious Point O Woods Country Club in Benton Harbor, Mich.

"We are truly excited to begin this year with several staff additions, program improvements and facility renovations we feel will set us apart from other clubs in Chicago," Tulk said.

Along with multiple dining areas and an outdoor swimming pool, the club maintains an active social calendar for couples, families and avid golfers. The Royal Fox Junior Coaching Programs are geared to juniors 6-13 and promote team building athletic skills. Regularly scheduled events include a Memorial Day & July 4th Pool BBQ Party, Mother's Day, Easter, Thanksgiving & Holiday Brunches, Father's Day Cookout, nightly specials and a variety of specialty wine and beer pairing dinners. The player development programs include golf clinics for all players throughout the season.

"Royal Fox and The Grove country clubs are unique in the Chicago metro area as both clubs are known for their premier golf and social events," said Tulk. "The club has a built-in reciprocity program with The Grove that allows players to experience a second club. We also have an amazing social environment that truly makes members feel like part of an extended family. Third, we are a family-oriented club with lots of programs and events geared toward every member of the family."

Regular golf membership at Royal Fox Country Club provides unlimited golf and amenity access to members and their families to both Royal Fox and The Grove, with a limited time offering to spread the initiation fee over time. Membership includes the primary member, spouse and children under 25. Young Executive memberships (under the age of 35) are available for individuals and families seeking a networking hub and social gathering space. Social memberships are also available and provide limited access to the golf course.

Schaumburg Golf Club, Schaumburg

Like the aforementioned Cantigny Golf, Schaumburg Golf Course was built as a 27-hole complex in 1926, the private Westmoor Country Club. Even in the middle year of a three-year renovation – one nine a year – the course will feature the luxury of late afternoon Nine & Dine events which launch on May 11 and have a continuous schedule through August 10. The \$30 package includes green fee,

cart and a \$12 voucher that night at the clubhouse's elegant Chandler's Chophouse & Grill.

The Langford and Moreau design was purchased by the village's park district in 1989 and renovated by renowned area architect Bob Lohmann, whose firm is now reprising its effort. Over the years, the course has hosted U.S. Open Qualifying events and the CDGA Mid-Am Championship. All three nines feature bentgrass fairways and undulating terrain.

Bolingbrook Golf Club, Bolingbrook

While Bolingbrook is an 18-hole course, the club is setting aside nine holes for a Couples Nine & Dine event on Friday, May 18 from 5:30–8 p.m. Spousal duos will compete in this net Peoria two-person scramble with prizes and hors d'oeuvres and drinks afterwards.

The 18-hole championship golf course was designed by Arthur Hills and Steve Forrest and stretches to 7,134 yards from the championship tees. The club's spectacular clubhouse features The Nest Bar & Grill with daily food and drink specials.

Silver Lake Country Club, Orland Park

Built in 1963, the executive nine known as Rolling Hills was created to complement the 36 holes on the property for decades, and inspired by the nine-hole course at Augusta National that opened three years earlier. Designed in-house by superintendent Ray Didier and pro Dudley Smith, and recently tweaked after the long-needed addition of a driving range necessitated the rearrangement of the South Course, Rolling Hills has seven par 3s and pair of drivable par 4s that might as well be par 3s on a windy day.

It's a quick play, fun for couples and beginners, and close to Orland and Tinley Park's vibrant shopping and restaurant scene, which includes The Tin Fish (18201 S. Harlem Ave.), the Bonefish Grill (15537 S. La Grange Rd.), a Cooper's Hawk Winery (15690 S. Harlem Ave.), a Rock Bottom restaurant (16156 S. La Grange Rd.), Isabella Italian Cafe (17211 S. Oak Park Ave.), and the perennially-crowded Cheesecake Factory on the west side of Orland Square, not far from Macy's, or, as traditionalists call it, Marshall Field's.

In 1976, an Englishman who owned a wine shop in Paris hit upon the idea of holding a blind tasting pitting ten of France's and California's best producers against one another. He enlisted nine French wine experts as judges; the French wines included the 1970 Haut-Brion, the 1970 Mouton Rothschild, and the 1973 Domaine Leflaive Puligny-Montrachet Les Pucelles.

The famous tasting has come to be known as The Judgement of Paris. No one expected the upstart Yanks to really put up a fight against the French heavyweights. However, when the votes were tallied, the judges were shocked to discover they had awarded the top prize for the red to the 1973 Stag's Leap Wine Cellars Cabernet Sauvignon, and top prize for the white to Chateau Montelena Chardonnay, both from Napa Valley. It was the shock heard 'round the world, and legitimized California as a world-class wine-making region.

Chateau Montelena has seen three cycles of family stewardship. The winery was founded in 1882 by Alfred L. Tubbs, a European immigrant and entrepreneur. The original property was 254 acres of rugged, stony, and loose land just two miles north of Calistoga at the base of Mount Saint Helena. (Montelena is a contracted form of Mount Saint Helena.) By 1896 Tubbs' winery was the seventh largest in the Napa Valley.

The Tubbs family sold the winery in 1958 to Yort and Jeanie Frank, who were looking for a peaceful spot to retire. The setting inspired Frank to excavate a lake and add landscaping to reflect the Chinese gardens of his homeland.

The modern renaissance of Chateau Montelena started under the leadership of Jim Barrett, who purchased the winery in 1972. The vineyard was cleared and replanted, and the chateau was renovated and outfitted with modern winemaking equipment, complemented by the highest-quality grapes from the Napa Valley. Shortly thereafter, Chateau Montelena stunned the wine world with its win at the 1976 Paris Tasting.

2015 Montelena Chardonnay \$58

This wine is brilliantly clear with a golden-straw color. The nose suggests pineapple and stone

fruit. On the palate, there are flavors of fresh orange zest and ginger which segues into a long and spicy finish. The wine was aged for 10 months in 100% French oak.

Serve this legendary wine with white-fish with filbert and lemon sauce, chicken Marsala, or duck with mustard and leeks.

●●●●● **2015 Montelena Cabernet Sauvignon \$61**
Dark ruby in color, this wine offers rich, complex aromas of fresh raspberries, strawberry jam, vanilla and black pepper. In the mouth, this wine makes a full soft round entry, after which the acid builds nicely, supporting the dominant flavor of dark stone fruit. Plenty of fine-grain tannin completes the mouthfeel, followed by a tremendous long finish.

Pair this Cabernet with beef in wine on skewers, grilled pork New Orleans, or leg of lamb in balsamic vinegar. ●●●●●



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Kicked Bucket

Put Dr. Phil, Judge Judy and Oprah in a room together and turn the cameras on. I sincerely doubt whether any or all could conjure an answer to life's eternal question: What happens to a golfer who has completed his bucket list and is still alive and puttin'?

All right, maybe Oprah knows the answer. She is, after all, Oprah. And the sad fact is that most golf bucket list creators never have to encounter this mystery, anyway. Given the difficulty level of some of the bucket lists I've viewed, most players check out long before the final item on their checklists have been checked. Items like: "Play 18 holes with Jason Day and Beyonce." And, "Receive an invitation to join Augusta National." Likelihood of either? To quote the indie rock band Dinosaur Jr.: "I don't think so."

Through some marvelous good fortune, I was both a witness and a participant in the completion of eight bucket lists late last year. The story started in April when my buddy Stu called with some astonishing news. He had just sold his ridiculously successful food business and wanted to celebrate his good fortune by hosting seven of his friends on a golf junket.

"There are lots of options," I helpfully volunteered, reciting factors like location, climate and affordability.

Stu cut me off in mid-babble. "There are no factors involved," he said curtly. "My buddies only have one destination and one item on each of their bucket lists," he declared. As Stu explained it, his pals wanted to play at the country's most famous resort; the place where U.S. Opens are won and lost; where the sea otters bark as you tee off; where Clint Eastwood hangs out; where Bing Crosby used to cavort, and where ocean waves crash beneath your feet as you sink your final putt.

"I think," I told him, "I get the picture."

Patience, along with ample amounts of cash, will secure rooms and tee times at Pebble Beach Resort in California. It took six months of waiting and the cost of a well-equipped Subaru Outback to launch our junket, which included rounds at Spanish Bay, Spyglass Hill and Pebble Beach Golf Links. We all met at San Francisco International and drove two rental SUVs south to the Monterey Peninsula.

Put together eight guys with diverse backgrounds and you yank open the double doors of your high school where every kid was defined by a skill or talent. Our octet included The Statistician

– the guy who organizes the teams and the stakes. Then there was The Prankster – the fellow who relentlessly teases every bartender, waitress and bellman. And of course there was The Jock – the local legend whose feats from 40 years ago are still celebrated in reverential tones. Somehow, somehow, I had walked onto the set of a geriatric John Hughes movie. The Breakfast Ball Club? Sad to say, none of us remotely qualified as The Good-Looking One.

Our rounds over the ensuing three days were a gratefully unrecorded version of an ESPN blooper reel. My tee shot on No. 2 at Spanish Bay was so far right that our caddies didn't even waste their time looking for the ball. My presumption was that they had already sized me up as a lousy tipper. At Spyglass Hill, we watched George's drive on No. 13 zip through the plexiglass cab window of a backhoe resting in the right rough. The caddies and landscaping crew all stopped to marvel at the ball's location inside the fortunately unmanned cab. George, of course, couldn't have cared less if he had killed the driver as he instead bemoaned the lost distance on his tee shot.

Playing the spectacular 8th hole at Pebble Beach, I trudged far off into the left rough and waited for my partner to hit his approach. The ball came off his club low, maybe 5-foot-8 or 5-9 off the ground. I knew this height exactly because I had to duck to avoid a hard shot to the temple. As I cowered, I watched in amazement as his ball hit the cart path curb and bounded past a bunker and through thick rough before miraculously settling 3-feet from the flagstick. "Greatest shot of my life!" Stu yelled with delight. Sadly, this was probably a fact.

We spent our final dinner at the resort reminiscing about three rounds that were memorable more for the story-telling and jokes than for the quality shot-making. After some speechifying about brotherhood, golf and the beauty of Monterey Bay, we were left to contemplate the fact that in a little less than four days we had each started and checked off the only item written on our personal golf bucket lists.

What does a golfer do after completing his bucket list? We pushed aside our desserts, pulled out our smartphones and began to consider a new adventure and the creation of a new single-item bucket list. The next time we meet will be at Bandon Dunes in Oregon on some week this summer.
